Fusion Platform.

United in a common cause for the sacred purpose of preserving the principles of government by the whole people, in fact as well as in name, restoring and maintaining equality, under that government, of all classes, we, the people's democratic and silver republican parties of the state of Oregon, waving all minor differences, and uniting for the purpose of carrying out the great underlying principles upon which we are all agreed, do make and present to the people of this state the following declaration of principles and to the carrying out of which we solemnly pledge each and every candidate upon our united ticket:

First—We demand the free and unrestricted coinage of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the consent of foreign nations; and we are unalterably opposed to the present republican administration in demanding the retirement of greenbacks, and the turning over of the money-making power of the government to the national banks as presented by the bill drawn by the republican secretary of the treasury, and indorsed by President McKinley; and we especially denounce the avowed attempt by said bill to take the gold standard forever upon the gold standard.

We demand a national money, safe and sound, issued by the general government only, without the intervention of banks of issue, to be a full legal tender for all debts, public and private; also a just, equitable and efficient means of distribution direct to the people through the lawful disbursements of the government.

We demand that the volume of circulating medium be speedily increased to an amount sufficient to meet the demands of the business and population of this country, and to restore the just level of prices of labor and production.

We favor such legislation as will prevent for the future the de-monetization of any kind of legal-tender money by private contract.

We demand the government, in payment of its obligations, shall use its option as to the kind of legal money in which they are to be paid, and we denounce the present and pending administrations for surrendering this option to the holders of government obligations.

We demand that there shall be no further issue of United States interest-bearing bonds that postal-savings banks be established by the government for the safe deposit of the savings of the people and facilitate exchange.

We demand the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.

We demand the initiative and referendum system of law-making in its optional form, local, state and national, and the submission by congress of all important national questions for an advisory vote of the people, until such time as the national convention shall have been amended so as to provide indirect legislation.

We condemn as dangerous and unjust the surrender, in all departments of the government, to the influence of wealth generally; and the packing of the highest courts of the land with corporate lawyers, too ready to do the will of their late employers, and to set aside valid and wholesome laws passed by the legislative departments of the states and government, upon flimsy pretexts, at the behests of such institutions.

We are opposed to government by injunction.

In state matters, we demand: A simple and well guarded registration law.

A more equitable mode of appointing judges of election laws to regulate the operation of fish traps, fish wheels and all fishing gear in the waters within the jurisdiction of the state.

We denounce and condemn the corrupt and extravagant republican legislative assemblies, and charge that the republican party, in its organization for the study of office, has become divided into warring factions, so that it is incapable of government as exemplified by the condition existing in the office of the state treasurer, those being at this time more than \$500,000 therein owing from the people by the process of taxation, while state warrants are stamped "Not paid for want of funds."

We demand that all district and county officers be placed upon salaries commensurate with the duties to be performed by them.

Inasmuch as railroad and other corporate property is not bearing its proportion of taxation, we demand that such property shall bear its just and equal share of the expenses of government.

Republican Speaking.

"Too bad—almost a complete failure." "Malcolm Moody has lost votes by coming here."

Such were the comments of several republicans after the speaking last Saturday evening at the hall.

There was a large audience present to listen to the speech of T. T. Geer, the largest, so he said, he had had the pleasure of addressing during the campaign. This certainly does not speak very favorably of his popularity in western and southern Oregon, for he has spoken in much larger towns than Burns.

Malcolm A. Moody, republican candidate for congress in this district, was first introduced and made a few remarks which were barely audible to those sitting on the first two or three tiers of seats. He simply stated that if elected he would try to carry out the principles of his party.

When "Tall Timothy" was introduced the chairman, A. W. Gowan, spoke of him as the next governor of Oregon, which seemed all right in the beginning but after his remarks on the money question the governor feeling materially dissatisfied and some republicans expressed dissatisfaction. Had he confined himself strictly to state questions it would have been much better for him. We do not believe Mr. Geer gained a single vote, but we do think he lost a few.

Judge W-hater was called upon and spoke a few minutes, giving a detailed account of his experience in soap making, but leaving political questions alone. It seemed his main object was to waken the people up from the stupor which had come over them during Geer's speech.

Mr. Moore, republican candidate for state treasurer, was also on the platform but was not called upon to speak. Messrs. Geer, Moody and Moore all left for Canyon Sunday afternoon and the silver forces here are none the worse off by their visit.
