In a recent issue the News gives as a reason for electing these candidates, that it has been the custom for sheep men from the outside to drive their sheep into the mountains of Grant and Harney counties to range during the summer and pay no taxes. It states that as these gentlemen are residents of these counties, it was to their personal interest to lend their support and work for legislation that would either keep the sheep out or if they were driven in to share their portion of taxation. While on the other hand, Mr. Morrow, the union nominee for joint-Senator, being a resident of Morrow county would from personal interest oppose legislation on this subject. That paper has simply sold out to the gold standard party and remembers there is a U. S. senator to be elected when the legislature meets next January. County Platform.

- 1. We demand the free and unlimited exchange of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, independent of the action of any other nation.
2. We demand that all money shall be issued directly by the government, without the intervention of banks and that all money be issued, whether gold, silver, or paper, shall be full legal tender for all debts, public and private.
3. We demand that no contract, or law, shall discriminate against any money issued by the government.
4. We oppose the issuance of any interest-bearing bonds in time of peace.
5. We prohibit against any legislation for the improvement of the paper currency of the United States.
6. We favor an income tax as a means of raising any of the revenue necessary to administer the Federal government.
7. We demand the election of U. S. Senators by a direct vote of the people.
8. We demand direct legislation in some practical form.
9. We demand the redemption of Oregon from their consolidated and corrupt methods, and demand honest elections, common laws, honest men and a strict adherence to the law.
10. We pledge ourselves to retrenchment in every and every expenditure and an effort to reduce the indebtedness of Harney county.

This is the last word we have to say to the voters of the county. It should be remembered that the present campaign, which will end next Monday, has been an exceptionally clean and fair one so far as newspaper work has been concerned. We can say, as was said in these columns at the beginning, that our nominees have made an honest effort upon their own merits. They have tried to get votes by reason of personal worth, and not by slander and misrepresentation. They do not claim to have secured nearly all the votes in the county, but leave this result with the voters themselves. We believe that the time has passed when a large part of the people can be fooled upon every occasion, and upon this belief predict victory for a large part, if not all, of the ticket.

The interest bearing debt of Harney County on July 1st, 1894, as shown by expert Jones' report was \$49438.17 over and above all resources. Total interest bearing debt May 6th, 1898, \$24522.55 a reduction of \$15915.52 in four years. This statement has been certified to by county clerk, sheriff and treasurer in their official capacity acting under oath and ought to be more reliable than the simple statement made by certain speculators in county warrants. All current expenses of the county must be paid in county warrants and any persons that seeks to depreciate their value by false statements is an enemy to the best interests of the tax payers.

The candidates on our ticket have been nominated and before the people now nearly three months, thus giving ample time to show their weakness as well as their strength. The average candidate has undoubtedly tried to show his strength, and if the people have not observed his weakness it is very late to start in now.

In 1889, when Harney county was created, we assumed \$19,000 of Grant county debt. Up to 1895 there had been 11 \$500 warrants redeemed from Grant county. Since that date up to May 15, 1898, 15 \$500 warrants have been redeemed.

We predict a sweeping victory for the free-silver forces all over our State.

There was added to the tax roll of 1897, \$284,649.

The Seattle Times of May 21st compares the Washington state legislature of 1895 under republican administration and the fusion legislature of 1897 and finds that the fusionists reduced the state debt during 16 months at the rate of \$102 per day. The republicans increased the state debt in two years at the rate of \$125 a day.

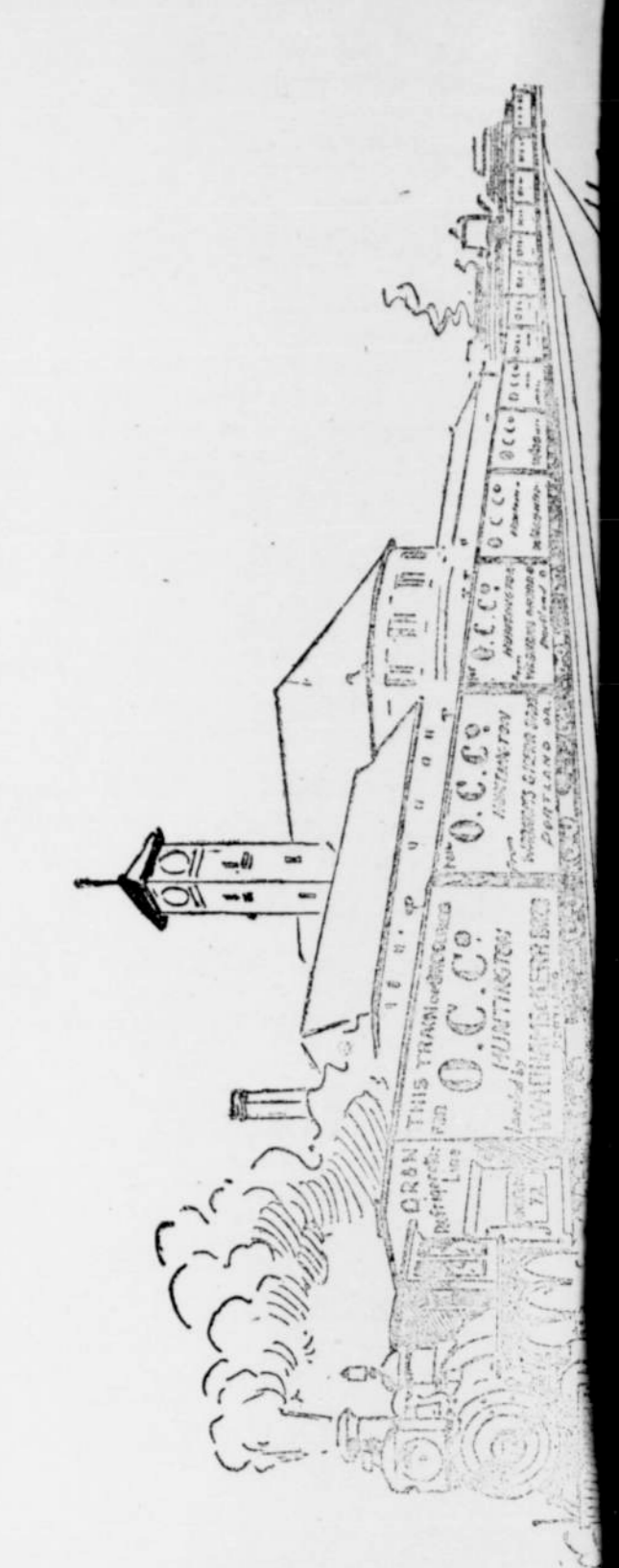
