Oregon Swamp Lands.

Washington, June 10.—David Brown of San Francisco has instituted suit in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia against Secretary Bliss of the Interior Department to restrain the Secretary and the subordinate officers of the Land Department from allowing entries and otherwise disposing of under the public land laws large tracks of land in Harney county, Or., heretofore embraced in the Oregon swamp land list No. 5.

This list was approved by Secretary Teller in 1882, but subsequently Secretary Lamar notified the governor of Oregon that the state would be required to show cause why the approval of the list should not be vacated, it having been reported by persons making investigations, under his direction, that Secretary Teller's approval of the list was secured through false and fraudulent representations and reports of the swampy character of the land. Later Secretary Vilas, after hearing the evidence, held secretary Teller's approval was procured through false and fraudulent representations as to the swampy character of some of the land embraced in the list, and canceled the former approval of the list and declared the dry lands open to entry and settlement.

The present suit is brought for the purpose of restraining Secretary Bliss from giving any effect whatever to Secretary Vilas' decision, it being claimed by plaintiff that Secretary Vilas had no jurisdiction in the matter after Secretary Teller had approved the list. Argument will be made in the case to-morrow.

Arguments were made before the Justice of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia to-day in the suit of Brown. Justice Cox announced that he would hand down a decision on Monday. If he follows a recent Supreme Court decision he will refuse the restraining order asked for by Brown.—Examiner.
