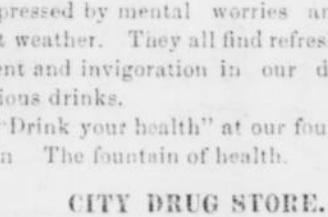

Latest War News.

Hong Kong, July 4.—The United States dispatch boat Seafarer, which left Cavite, Manila harbor on July 1st, has arrived here. She reports that the American troops on the transports City of Sidney, City of Pekin and Australia conveyed by the Charleston, arrived at Cavite, June 30th, having taken the Ladrones Islands on the way and having left men there. The Spanish governor and other officials captured were brought to Cavite.

The United States troops commenced disembark at Cavite on July 1st.

Washington, July 4.—The secretary of the navy has received the following:

Playa del Este, via Hayti, July 4, to Secretary of the Navy, 3:15 a. m. Sidney July 4.—The fleet under my command offers the nation as a Fourth of July present, the destruction of the whole of Cervera's fleet.

Not one escaped. It attempted to escape at 9:30 a. m. and at 2 p. m. the last ship, the Cristobal Colon, had run ashore six miles west of Santiago and let down her colors.

The Infanta Maria Theresa, Oquendo and Viscaya were fired ashore, burned and blown up within 20 miles of Santiago; the Furor and Pluton were destroyed within four miles of the port. Loss, one killed and two wounded.

The enemy's loss is probably several hundred from gun fire, explosions and drowning.

About 1300 prisoners were taken, including Admiral Cervera.

The man killed was George H. Ellis, chief yeoman of the Brooklyn. (Signed) SAMPSON.

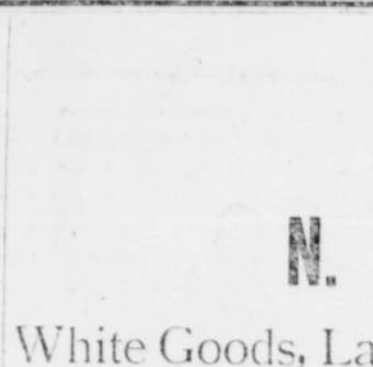
Washington, July 4.—The following is the correspondence of Shafter as to the surrender of Santiago:

Playa del Este, July 4.—Hon. R. A. Alger, Secretary of War, Washington D. C., Headquarters Fifth Army Corps, July 3.—The following is my demand for the surrender of Santiago:

Headquarters of United States Forces, Near San Juan River, Cuba, July 3, 1898, 8:39 a. m.—To the Commanding General of the Spanish forces, Santiago de Cuba. Sir: I shall be obliged, unless you surrender, to shell Santiago de Cuba. Please inform the citizens of foreign countries and all women and children that they should leave the city before 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Very respectfully your obedient servant, W. R. SHAFER, Major General United States Army.

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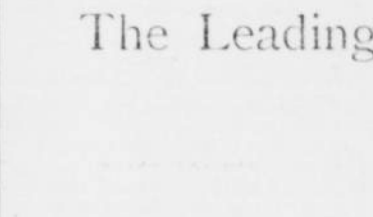
