At the residence of Harvey Dixey, near this place, last Friday, at 7:30 o'clock p.m., Oliver Farra, aged 70 years.

The deceased was born near Kimbleville, Chester county, Pa., April 13, 1825. Came to California in an early day and followed mining for several years. Came to this county July 1st, 1883, where he settled on a ranch near Burns. He invested considerable money in stock which business he followed until a few years ago when he sold all his cattle. Mr. Farra was a very eccentric man and although he was known to be worth several thousand dollars, his most intimate friends do not know where it is deposited or invested. He has no relatives here, but we are informed there is a brother and two sisters in the east.

The remains were interred in the I. O. O. F. plot of the Burns cemetery, Mr. Farra being an Ancient Odd Fellow.



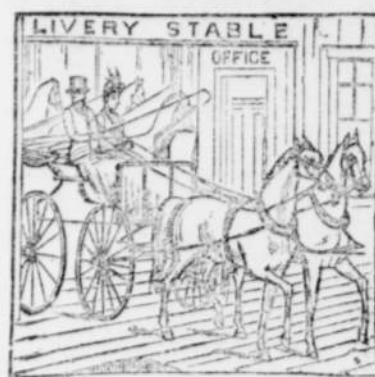
