Riley, Or. Oct. 28, 93. ED. THE TIMES-HERALD: On the 25th inst. Messrs. Wood Best Link Hutton and J. Z. Hogan were on the road home from Lakeview, when about 7 miles north of Alkali spring on the desert, they had been walking, Hogan put his foot on the hub of the front wheel of his wagon and somehow it slipped off and he fell under the hind wheel it passing over the small of his back. The wagon was loaded with 4000 lbs. The boys placed him on a wagon and hauled him to S. Hutton's on Wagonette, when Link Hutton started for Dr. Marsden. He met W. H. Hogan, brother of the unfortunate man, between Silver creek and Burns and told him the sad news; Mr. Hogan started for the bedside of his brother as fast as horse flesh could take him but arrived too late as Zack had obeyed the summons, dying at 4 o'clock and William arrived at 12. The remains were brought to the Hogan home on Silver creek and laid to rest in the little grave yard. He leaves his aged parents, two brothers and a sister in the Wil-

lamette valley and one brother W. H. Hogan, on Silver creek. His father was 80 years old the day Zack died, and I am told, like his son Zack, has not an enemy on earth—good to be said of anyone.

Zack and W. H. Hogan have been associated in farming, sheep and cattle raising for 25 years and everything has moved smoothly and harmoniously, and by industry and fair dealing had accumulated a competence and were among our heaviest taxpayers.

W. H. Hogan had been on a visit to the Willamette and expected to find Zack at home upon their return but he was gone and they never again saw him alive. Where they fondly hoped to witness the smiles of joy and bright sun light of long continued happiness, there is mourning and bitter tears of regret.

The deceased was a very quiet citizen attending to his own business and never meddling with others, he commanded the respect of all who knew him. The settlement in which he lived for years has lost a valuable and worthy citizen. To his relatives I beg to assure them they are not alone; I too, have lost a friend in whom I put the utmost confidence and one whom it always gave me pleasure to grasp by the hand; for his cordial handshake was not that of a dishonest or deceitful man.

Forty years of honest toil, faithful and strict loyalty to duty and country are sufficient to entitle any man to our highest regard and to command the respect of all persons even though he possessed no other redeeming qualities.

I shall always remember my friend with kindest feelings. He has gone to his grave honored by those who knew him, leaving to his aged father and mother, brothers, sisters and friends a legacy more valuable than stocks, bonds, gold, silver or landed estates—a name untarnished.
