There seems to be a misunderstanding between the patrons of our school district and the board. Last Monday morning quite a number of children were excused from school, because they did not pay tuition. This district has been imposed upon for years by people coming in from the outside, sending their children to school, not paying tuition, and in the spring moving away and their children enumerated in another district. This year the board of directors are trying to put a stop to it. The school is now so large that it has become necessary to employ another teacher. The plan of the directors is to charge all tuition who were not enumerated in this district last spring, with the understanding that the said tuition be refunded if the pupils are enumerated in this district next spring.

The directors have no desire to work a hardship on those of our citizens who have moved here since last spring and are going to make this place their home but as the district is in debt this plan is adopted to prevent this imposition and collect tuition from those who should pay. Some of these people who came here since last spring are not able to advance the amount of tuition. The board should not prevent their children from going to school but should make some kind of arrangements to protect the district and not prevent the attendance of the children. A note, deposited with the clerk, without interest, to be returned, cancelled, after the children have been enumerated next spring, or some such plan.

Many of these cattle, if not all, would have necessarily been fed through this winter and perhaps sold next spring for very little more than now. Some of our stock men who disposed of their stock do not take this great religion weekly or will acknowledge its worth. 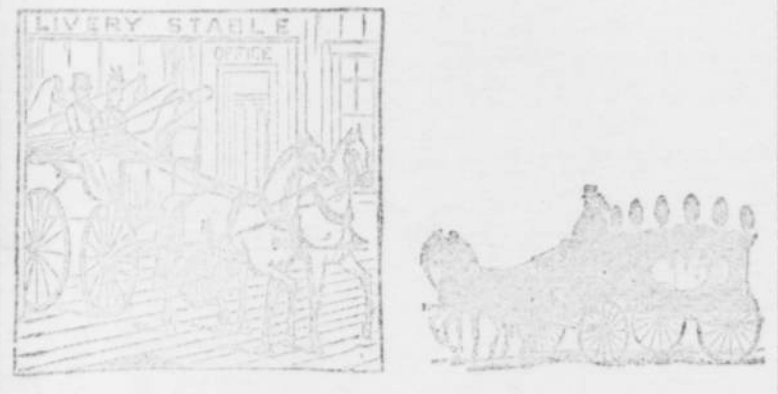

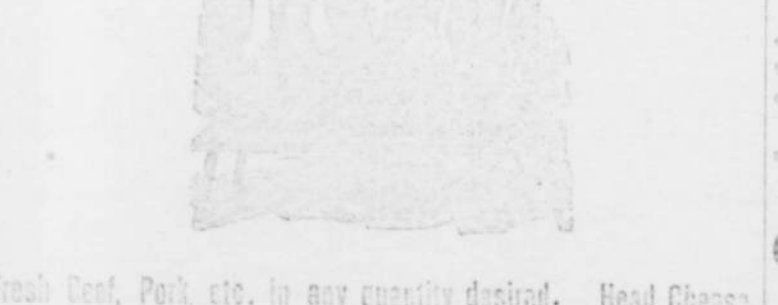
