The miners and people generally from the interior who are coming out with money are warned by the Skagway Alaskan against the counterfeit \$100 silver certificates that are in circulation, and which it is believed by the detectives have been made by counterfeiters with the deliberate intention of placing them in the hands of Klondikers and others coming from the north who have money. Nearly 90 per cent of the counterfeit bills detected have been found in the hands of Klondikers and others from the north. The detectives of the country believe that the bills are manufactured in San Francisco. It has been known for some time that counterfeit \$100 silver certificates were in circulation and the treasury has called in all certificates of that denomination. This has had the effect of taking away the value of the bill as legal tender and banks will only accept the money for collection.—Ex.
