Prospects of Fights.

Portland, Or., Jan. 14.—Many members of the legislature arrived in Portland yesterday and today to spend Sunday. From present indications the fights of the session will be over Senator Daly's school law bill, Senator Mackay's pilotage bill and the special appropriation bill. There also promises to be some fun over railroad bills to be introduced later in the session. From the fact that they will emanate from populist sources, vigorous opposition can be predicted with safety. The school law bill will be fought by the hook trust and the pilotage bill law by the Astoria pilots. The row over special appropriation bill will result from an effort to reduce all appropriations to a minimum and cut off some of the normal schools and charitable institutions entirely. It is probable that the books of ex-Secretary Kincaid will be given a thorough investigation by a legislative committee.
