Burns will soon have a city charter second to none in Eastern Oregon. Messrs. Our old charter is wholly inadequate to meet the needs of our growing city and as it is only a matter of a very short time now necessity will demand electric lights, sewerage system and waterworks. Ample provisions have been made for same and the city may erect, own and maintain its own water and light system. The citizens could recognize the fact that fire protection is the paramount issue and of the most vital interest to the inhabitants of the city and it is to be hoped that upon the approval of this act, they will at once take such steps as will be necessary to exact a complete water system.
