The re-appointment bill has passed both houses. If the governor approves this bill, Harney, Malheur and Baker counties will constitute a territorial district and be entitled to one senator jointly. Harney and Malheur will constitute one representative district and shall be entitled to one representative jointly.

We have received a copy of the bill relating to compensation of county officials introduced by Senator Morrison. The bill, as it was introduced, effects a serious economy plan, but a letter from Mr. Morrison informs us that the bill would come from the committee much amended, simply at the request of different members who want to reduce or change the salaries of their own counties. Harney county remains the same.

Burns will soon have a city charter second to none in Eastern Oregon. Messrs. Byrd & Turner have just completed it and forwarded copies to our Senator and Representative urging them to have it acted upon before the adjournment of the present Legislature. Our old charter is wholly inadequate to meet the needs of our growing city and as it is only a matter of a very short time when necessity will demand electric lights, sewerage system and water works. Ample provisions have been made for raising the city money and, own and maintain, its own water and light systems. The council will recognize the fact that fire protection is the paramount issue and of the most vital interest to the inhabitants of the city and it is to be hoped that upon the approval of this act, there will at once take such steps as will be necessary to erect a complete water system.
