The Salem postoffice has two clerks of exceptional ability, and are generally commended for their uniform courtesy to all patrons of the office. But their trials are numerous and quite frequently is their patience tested almost beyond endurance.
One day recently Miss Zadio Palmer, the ever obliging and accommodating clerk, was seated at the delivery window, when suddenly a freckle-faced girl presented

herself at the window, and inquired:

Fled Before the Gun.
The Dalles, Feb. 23.—Considerable excitement has been aroused by the announcement that another bloody affray in The Dalles was narrowly averted last night. In an encounter in a saloon, Receiver Otis Patterson, of The Dalles land office, assailed Postmaster Crossen, and, being separated from him, drew a revolver and pursued him, driving him from the house.
It seems that bad blood has existed between the parties for some time, Patterson having been very recently removed from his office to make a place for one of his (Patterson's) personal friends. This activity was resented by Crossen, who had some words with Patterson yesterday morning. Yesterday evening, Crossen on entering a saloon, found Patterson there, and as he was leaving was called back by the latter, who opened a conversation which soon became hot. Patterson, who is a large man, seized Crossen by the throat and was proceeding to administer punishment, when stopped by bystanders. Shaking loose from them, he drew his pistol, and a general clean out ensued, Patterson following Crossen to the door.
Patterson has been arrested on charges of carrying a concealed weapon, and of assault with a deadly weapon. He will appear before the city recorder tomorrow at 10 a. m. He was released on his own recognizance.
Another Fight at Manila.
Manila, Feb. 23 a. m.—There was an outbreak of incendiarism, accompanied by fighting in Manila last evening. The casualties were few but the property loss is enormous.
FURTHER DETAILS.
Manila, Feb. 23, 3 a. m.—Immense damage has been done by fires which are believed to have been started by insurgents last night. The fire department has experienced great difficulty in fighting the flames owing to defective apparatus. It is reported that the natives have damaged the apparatus.
There was some fighting in the streets during the night but the Americans quickly quelled the uprising. A number of insurgents were killed and several Americans soldiers wounded.
A large market place was among the first to burn. Between 600 and 700 residences and business houses have been destroyed. Fires were started at several points simultaneously and spread with great rapidity, resisting all efforts to control them. Hundreds of homeless native are huddled in the streets, making patrol duty of the Americans very difficult.
