County Bill Rejected.

Salem, Or., March 23.—The costs of examining and committing insane persons is not to be borne by the state, although the expense of transportation is, according to an opinion rendered at the request of Secretary of State Dunbar by Attorney-General Blackburn this morning. The opinion was the result of the receipt at the secretary's office from Harney county of a bill for \$52 for the examination and commitment of Charles Carlson, an insane person, the first of the kind ever presented. The opinion quotes the law on the subject of handling insane persons, which provides among other things that "the expense of sending insane and idiotic persons committed to the asylum shall be paid by the state treasurers on the warrant of the secretary of state out of the fund appropriated for such purpose," and "the costs of examination and commitment shall be paid by the county in which the examination is made to be repaid to the county as hereinafter provided," and then say: "This law was enacted in 1878, and this is the only claim to be reimbursed that has been presented against the state by any county. The construction of this statute, which has at least been acquiesced in for more than 20 years, has been that the state is not liable for these costs and charges; but they must be borne by the respective counties, and his silent construction of the statute is entitled to some consideration in determining the true construction to be given it." The opinion speaks of the mode and manner of examining insane persons and the power of county judges and concludes as follows: "I am of the opinion that you cannot audit and allow the claim of Harney county for the examination of said C. A. Carlson, an insane person, or any part thereof."
