Handwriting Expert.
The trial of the alleged train robbers, Shaw and Bowie, progressed slowly. The forenoon session of the Court was devoted to the examination and cross-examination of S. H. Kitto, who gave expert testimony as to a signature brought down from Burns, Oregon. It seems that on a cash book which has been brought from Burns, appears the name of Bowie, one of the defendants, which it is claimed Bowie wrote in the book on July 15th.
If Bowie was at Burns on the 15th of July, it is evident he could not have taken part in the robbery. The expert knocked this idea out, however, as far as the signature in the cash book is concerned, by testifying that there had been an erasure in the place where the name was written, and the name then written there.
Frank Baldwin, a witness for the defense wished to get away from town, and was put on the stand out of order. His testimony was taken this afternoon.
