In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Harney.

Reports of the Grand Jury for the April, 1899, term of said court.

To the Hon. M. D. Clifford Judge of said court,

We your Grand Jury for the above entitled term, submits this, our final report, and respectfully ask to be discharged.

We have been in session five days have investigated all complaints made before us and have found two true bills of indictment.

We have examined into the circumstances attending the killing of Willis Meyers last February at Drewsey in this county, and have concluded that the homicide was justifiable.

We have examined, as far as practicable, in the limited time allowed us, the books and offices of the several county officials, and find that the same appear to be neatly kept and in good order.

We have examined the jail of the county, and find the same in good condition.

We have examined the county poor house and find the same to be in good order, and the inmates thereof have proper care and attention.

We wish to call the attention of the County Court to the recommendations of many previous grand juries as to the necessity for improvements in the county jail, court house and out buildings.
