O-B Stage Held Up.

The Ontario-Burns stage held up last Friday night about 9 o'clock at a point 3 miles this side of Westfall by three men. There were no passengers only the driver Geo. Adshire and his son. Two of them held up the men on the coach while the other took out all the mail bags including those that contained the paper mail, and then they ordered the driver to go on.

All the mail pouches were found the next day and it appeared nothing had been touched but the registered mail. It is not known at this time how much was taken, it being the opinion there was very little registered mail.

A letter from Sheriff Lacey of Malheur county states that there is a posse in pursuit of the robbers.

The driver states that one of them appeared to be about 40 years old and would weigh between 165 and 180 pounds, the other two being younger one about 25, slender and very dark the other being only a boy between 17 and 18.

It is rumored that three men answering their description had been arrested near Pendleton, but we could not get any particulars. The Times-Herald tried to reach Pendleton by telephone but up to the hour we go to press nothing had been received in regard to the matter.

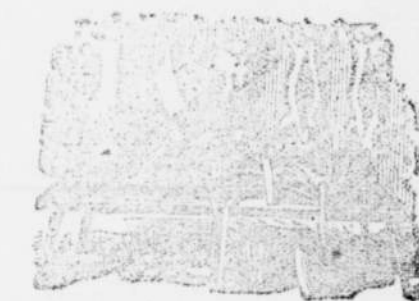
