In a statement given out at Lincoln, Neb., a few days ago W J Bryan says, in effect, that he had no intention of seeking a third nomination for the presidency.

Mr. Bryan's announcement is in answer to an article in an Eastern paper speculating on his future plans as a political leader. Mr. Bryan said: "I am not planning for another presidential nomination, for if I were I would not be editing a paper; if I ever become a candidate again it will be because it seems necessary for the advancement of the principles to which I adhere, and that does not seem probable. I shall, however, continue to take an active interest in politics for several years yet, if I live, and can be relied upon to support those who, as candidates, advocate Democratic principles and who can be trusted to enforce them if elected."

"I have no enemies to punish, no matter what anyone may have said of the ticket in 1896 or 1900; that man becomes my friend the moment he accepts democratic principles. Neither have I any disposition to reward political friends at the expense of our cause. No matter what a man may have done or said for the ticket in 1896 or 1900, that man becomes an opponent the moment he turns against democratic principles. Political battles are fought not in the past or in the future, but in the present. The heretofore cannot be recalled and the hereafter cannot be anticipated, but the now is all-important."

J. P. Morgan, who went to London a few weeks ago, presumably for his health, has been amusing himself by buying a big piece of land in the Associated Press dispatches say this is the first step in the direction of the consolidation of some of the biggest trans-Atlantic shipping interests. Mr. Morgan will certainly have to draw the line somewhere. He will have to move to Oregon before he can get hold of our local stage lines and he would have to build a railroad in here to down the freight teams. So we're safe for a while at least.

There is a strong probability that Majk Hanna will be the republican candidate for president in 1904, and it is possible that his opponent will be Tom Johnson of Cleveland. Johnson would poll a great labor vote, and he has a barrel of his own that might be drawn upon for campaign funds. With the support of "Golden Rule" Jones and John R. McLean, Johnson would give Uncle Mark a warm run for his money. There is little doubt that Johnson would distance Hanna in their home town of Cleveland.--Walla Walla Statesman.

TWO MEN SHOT.

Early this morning John Maher and John Wyatt, of Harney, were preparing to start to Baker City. An hour later both were found dead in the latter's yard shot. A pistol was found under Maher's body and it is the general opinion that Maher, who has not been well, in a fit of temporary insanity, shot Wyatt and then killed himself. Particulars are hard to obtain by phone. Both men were highly respected citizens. Coroner Marsden, Sheriff Shelley and Deputy Sheriff Mothershead have gone to the scene.

LATER--At 2 o'clock this afternoon a phone message to THE TIMES-HERALD states that it was a clear case of homicide and suicide. Wyatt was shot twice, one ball entering his breast and the other just over the ear. Maher was shot just to the left of the nose. The post mortem examination has not been finished.

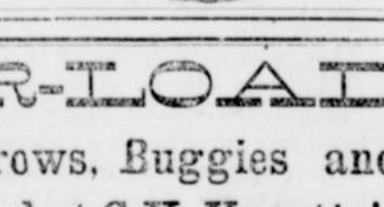
