Baker City—Burns Railroad.

Baker City, May 6—A gentleman closely connected with the Sumpter Valley road says there is a strong probability of a road being built by his people from here to Burns. A road from Baker City to Burns would, if the road now being built north from the Central Pacific in Nevada, comes to Burns, make a through line from here to California. The same people are known to be interested at both ends of the proposed road, the southern portion of which is now under construction. It would pass through a rich timber and mining region, and there is every incentive for the people who are said to be interested to build it. The road would furnish the one thing necessary to the development of a large section of Eastern Oregon mining country, viz., cheap transportation.

The Sumpter Valley Railroad was built for the purpose of hauling saw logs and lumber to the mill and market, but the owners had an idea that they could do some business in the way of transporting ore and mine supplies, and they were not disappointed. The road opened up a good mining country, or rather made it possible by reason of cheapening transportation charges, for the mines to be worked at a profit, and today the freight and passenger business pays expenses of the road and leaves a neat profit besides.

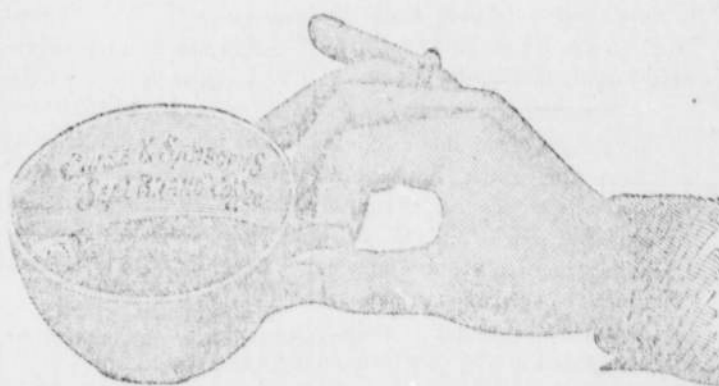

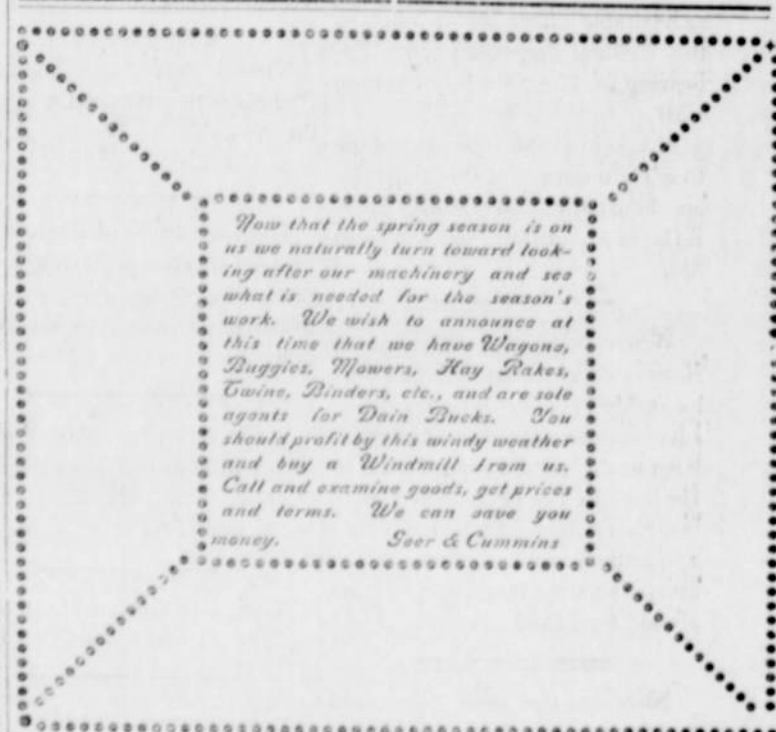

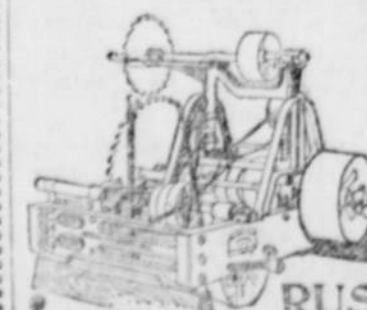
