Dr. Cline has sold 80 acres of his ranch at Cline Falls on the Des Chutes river to A. E. Hammond for \$2500.

Cline Falls is conceded to be one of the best sites for water power on the Des Chutes river. It is practically valueless for any other purpose, but it is suggestive when we think that there are thousands of acres up and down the river that can be bought for one-tenth of the price paid for this—and better land so far as the land is concerned.

A. E. Hammond, the purchaser is the Chief Engineer of the Columbia Southern Railway company, and we are informed, a brother of President Hammond of the Corvallis & Eastern Railway. This, it seems, would give this deal some importance as effecting the Railroad prospects of Crook county, but which railroad is to profit by this is a matter entirely left to conjecture.

Cline Falls has no present value as a water power. We have no raw material other than handling timber, of much consequence ready to utilize the vast power of the Des Chutes river.—Prineville Review.

An article from the San Francisco Call, favoring range leasing, appears on our first page. It strikes the keynote of the leasing question and plainly shows that it is a lick at the wool growers. We copy it merely to show our stockmen the argument put up in its favor and to let them see what they have to fight. Such articles in the large dailies have much influence with the public who do not stop to think about the damage it would do to the advancement of a sparsely settled country in the way of increasing population and the location of public lands for homes. Leasing the range would certainly be a benefit to the big cattle concerns but who else would it help?

The work that a local newspaper does for the town is something that can only be measured by the editor himself. The local newspapers are continually striving to build up the town, to bring in new industries, to make the place more beautiful and doing all to make the town more prosperous than its neighbors. The local paper is a tireless worker for the moral, social and fraternal life of the town and nothing is left undone to make the place and its people celebrated far and near. Yet in spite of all these facts, there is not half the patronage given to the local papers that they deserve.—Lawton Standard.

We learn through our exchanges that the killing frosts of last week was not a local affair, but visited all Eastern Oregon, Idaho, Nevada and on East as far as Illinois comes the news of great damage to fruit, gardens, young trees and grain. Even alfalfa was frozen in some sections which proves that the frost in other sections was even more severe than here. Harney Valley will have a great big hay crop and possibly more grain than is now thought.

The St. James Gazette seldom treats its English readers to anything like editorial humor, but in an article headed "The Anglo-Saxon Millennium," the saintly London paper comments on a pessimist's proposal that "Yankee Doodle" be made the national anthem; that the American language be made compulsory in the schools, and that the coronation of J. Pierpont Morgan be arranged for the Fourth of July next.

We are informed that sheep shearing in the Stein mountain country is progressing very slowly on account of lack of men. Only

one crew is now shearing in that section and many thousand head of sheep are still wearing their winter coats.

After a good deal of agitation on the subject the Board of State Land Commissioners of Montana has decided to abandon the practice of leasing land in large tracts to cattle and sheepmen. It will reappraise and sell agricultural land as fast as leases expire.—Vale Democrat.

The race between New York and London for distinction of being the largest city, approaches a climax, and in ten years more, if the relative increase is maintained by both commonwealths, New York will have distanced her rival by more than a million and a half of people. London now has, including the city proper and 28 metropolitan boroughs, 4,536,034 people, an increase of 308,718 since the census of 1891. The present population of New York and boroughs is 3,499,091, an increase of 1,000,000 over the enumeration of ten years ago. Let the same ratio of increase continue ten years longer and New York will exceed London in population quite as much as the English metropolis now leads the American city.
