

Circuit Judge H. L. Benson, of the first judicial district, and who resides in Klamath Falls, was in Portland the other day and in an interview with a representative of the Oregonian stated that his portion of Eastern Oregon was still waiting patiently for a railroad.

"We thought we had the railroad all right last year, as the Oregon Midland road was surveyed up the Klamath river from Klamath, in northern California. The enterprise proceeded as far as the letting of a 60-mile contract to Hale & Kern, of Portland, and the contractors began to get ready to put their men, teams and implements on the job, but the men who were to capitalize the Oregon Midland proved to have been without the necessary financial backing, and after they went back to Chicago to send the money out for the sale of the bonds, nothing further was heard from them.

"I understand, however, that there is a party of surveyors in the field, headed for Klamath Falls from Hornbrook, or some point on the Southern Pacific, and rumor has it that President Hayes, of the Southern Pacific, is at the back of the movement. If this is the case, we will have a road, as that corporation has the means to go ahead, and in all probability the directors have heard of the big, rich territory to be tapped in Klamath, Lake and Harney counties.

"In the meantime the undeveloped riches of the country repose in the soundest kind of slumber. The great forests of timber silently await the woodsman's axe, to be sawed into the lumber the world is now demanding. The wide prairies, capable of raising millions of bushels of wheat, are still unused, except for pasturage, and we of Klamath county have to ride night and day in the old-fashioned thoroughbred stage-coach, in order to reach the train at Ager, which is to carry us to Portland."

The Sacramento Record-Union a republican paper, has this to say of the Cuban question:

"The dispatches now report that Cuba has accepted the Platt amendment conditions of 'freedom' by a majority vote in her constitutional convention. She is, in fact, 'up against it,' and is to be free only to the length of the string we attach to her liberty. We promised her by word of mouth absolute, unrestricted freedom and independence, but in the change of heart we have undergone we have proved the hollowness of lip service."

The juniper lumber of Eastern Oregon has attracted the attention of the manufacturers of the East. The samples of work in juniper wood placed on exhibition at Washington, D. C., is beginning to bear fruit. Crook county is a wonderful country and its people are becoming progressive and Prineville will become what it ought to be, the leading city of Eastern Oregon.—Prineville Review.
