

How to raise hogs at 2 cents per pound, is a problem solved by R. C. Judson, industrial agent for the O. R. & N. Co. And Mr. Judson says it is no trick, either. He uses no other means than pure luxuriant alfalfa, such as he grows on the O. R. & N. Company's experimental farm at Whitman Station. Colonel Judson, however, does not intend to go into the hog-raising business, at least for the present, but has made the experiment simply to establish to those who may profit thereby, that it can be done, and without great efforts, too.

The illustrious industrial agent has also come to the conclusion that a cow can be kept the year round on one acre of ground. Of course this would not hold good should the bovine be fenced in on one acre of ground and allowed run around at will. It means the proper cultivation and tilling of the soil.—Portland Telegram.

When you start in next Monday morning just remember that in the transmission of your business you will not have to "lick" war revenue stamps as heretofore. While of course the war tax is not entirely repealed on some things, yet it is greatly modified. The taxes entirely repealed are the two-cent tax on bank checks, the ten-cent tax on bills of lading for export, the fifty-cent tax on bonds not specified other than indemnity bonds, the two-cent tax on certificates not specified in the present law, the \$20 tax on commercial brokers, the two-cent tax so sight drafts, the twenty-five-cent to one dollar tax on leases, the tax on money orders, the tax on mortgage and conveyance in trust, the two-cent tax on promissory notes and the twenty-five-cent tax on protests.

DIED.—The sudden and unexpected death of Dr. S. B. McPheeters on last Saturday evening cast a gloom over our little city. Dr. McPheeters was an old and highly respected citizen. He seemed to be in his usual health and had been fishing during the day. He had been sitting talking with his grand daughter waiting for his son Charles to return from band practice and finally, complained of being quite fatigued, had retired in an adjoining room. He kept up the conversation, for a while and the young lady noticed that his breathing became labored for a short time then all was quiet. She spoke to him and receiving no answer, stepped to his bedside to see if he had fallen asleep. He was dead. A long and very useful life had been spent and he had gone to his reward. Dr. Geary was called and pronounced it heart disease. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon from the Baptist church, of which deceased was a member. Rev. A. J. Irwin conducting the services, after which the remains were taken in charge by Burns Lodge, No. 97, A. F. & A. M. the deceased having been a member of the Masonic fraternity since early in life. Dr. Samuel Bowman McPheeters was born May 15, 1828, in Missouri. He began the practice of medicine in 1850 and the same year was married to Jennie A. Carpenter, of Davenport, Iowa. His wife died in 1881. Dr. McPheeters practiced medicine in Jasper county, Mo., for about 20 years. He came Grand Ronde Valley, this state, in 1885, and moved to this valley in 1887 where, with the exception of about two years spent in Western Oregon, he had resided since. Four of nine children survive him: Mrs. Stacey Smith, of Humansville, Mo., Mrs. Frank Johnson, of Prineville, Mrs. L. E. Culp and Charles E. McPheeters, of this place.

DIED.—Harry A. Logganb elovod son of J. H. and E. D. Loggan, of Harney, died at the home of Mrs. Etta Dodson of this place, on Sunday, the 23rd instant, of tuberculosis of the bowels, after a lingering sickness of eight months. For several years before his death, he had been heard to occasionally complain of stomach and bowel trouble, but being of a restless and energetic disposition, he never ceased work until about the 1st day of December, 1900, when he was brought home, unable longer to withstand the ravages of the disease that had fastened itself upon his system. On January 26th he was brought to Burns for medical treatment, where on February 8th an operation was performed in the hopes of saving his life. He was, however, beyond the aid of human help, and at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, on June 23, surrounded by the members of the family, he quietly passed away. At 10 o'clock in the forenoon he told his father that the end was near, and asked that all the members of the family be called, for he wished to bid them "good by" for the last time on earth. His mind was clear and active to the last moment, his last words being "Farewell, I am happy, and I am going to a better land." The deceased was born in Washington county, Kansas, October 28, 1878, being twenty-two years, seven months and twenty-five days old at the time of his death. The family moved to Union county, Oregon, in 1879, and in May, 1885, to Harney City, where he grew to manhood. He leaves, besides his parents, two brothers and six sisters, as well as a host of friends to mourn his early death. The remains were interred in the Harney cemetery last Monday, Rev. A. J. Irwin conducting the services.
