All of these states, with the exception of Virginia, were carried by the republicans in 1900. In some of the other states it is conceded that the result will be closer than for several years. The fusion ticket in Nebraska will most likely be elected, while in Pennsylvania the democrats and independent republicans have made common cause against the regular organization which is in the control of the Quay faction. This will possibly result in downing Quay. There is also much interest taken in the election in New York city where the contest is between Tammany and Platt republicans for control of greater New York.

A Fatal Accident.

On Monday a young man by the name of Lee Lemon was fatally hurt by a horse falling on him near the school house on Buck creek. He and a companion were going to the school house to attend divine services and when in a short distance of the school house the horse ridden by his companion shied in front of his horse causing the animal to fall, throwing Mr. Lemon into a rock pile, fracturing his skull at the temple and also at the base, from which he died Tuesday, just a few minutes before Dr. Marsden, who had been sent for, arrived.

The young man never recovered consciousness after the fall. The deceased was a very industrious, steady young man 20 years old and had been working for W. W. Brown for the past year. His parents live on Twelve Mile Creek county. The remains were buried Thursday at Silver creek.

MURDERER PAYS PENALTY FOR CRIME.

Murder of President Goes to his Death Unrepentant.

Auburn, New York Oct. 2.—At 7:12:12 this morning Leon Czolgosz, murderer of President McKinley, was shocked to death by 1700 volts of electricity. He showed no particular fear, talking to the witnesses while being strapped to the chair.

"I killed the president because he was an enemy to the good working people. I am not sorry for my crime."

These were his words as the guards hurried him into the chair. A moment later, numbing through the half-adjusted face straps he said:

"I am awfully sorry I could not see my father."

Czolgosz slept soundly. Warden Mead awakened him at 5 o'clock and read the death warrant to him. As the Warden stepped away Czolgosz called:

"I would like to talk with the superintendent."

The warden responded: "He will be down presently."

At 5:15 the prisoner was dressed. Superintendent Collins visited him at 5:30. Czolgosz said:

"I want to make a statement before you kill me."

"What do you want to say?" he was asked by the superintendent.

"I want to make it while there are a lot of people present. I want them to hear me," said the prisoner.

"Well, you cannot," said the superintendent.

"Then I won't talk at all," said the prisoner sullenly.

Czolgosz ate breakfast with a relish. While he was eating the witnesses were gathered.

From the time Czolgosz left his cell until the time he was electrocuted less than four minutes elapsed.

CARBOID OF ACID POURED ON BODY.

Auburn, N. Y. Oct. 20.—The body of Czolgosz was buried this afternoon. A carboy of acid was poured upon it. The physicians believe it will be entirely disintegrated in 12 hours.
