The grade proposed to be laid or constructed should be established and constructed in accordance with a survey heretofore made as shown by the stakes set along said street by the surveyor, showing the height of the proposed grade and sidewalks. All persons owning property abutting said street between the points above mentioned and desiring to file a remonstrance against the proposed improvement shall file the same in writing with the undersigned recorder, not later than 8 days from the date of this notice.

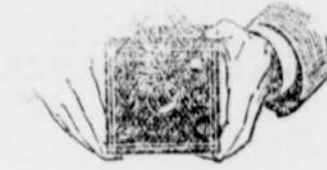

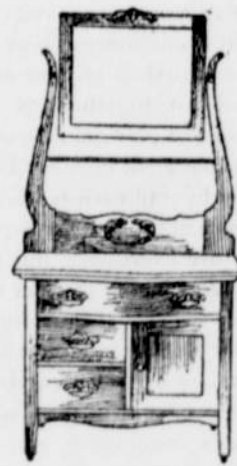
