The Argus says the meeting of the Malheur and Harney county Woolgrowers Association, held in Ontario Nov 20 was well attended. Among those from this county it mentioned James Paul, J. D. Jenkins, A. S. Swain and W. J. King. The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we, the Malheur and Harney county woolgrowers in session assembled, at Ontario, Or., on Wednesday, November 20, 1903, do hereby request the honorable county courts of Malheur and Harney counties, State of Oregon, that the stock inspectors of said county and state, who are appointed by said courts, be thorough sheepmen and one actively engaged in the sheep industry; that they be appointed as such stock inspectors upon the petition of a majority of the several sheepmen of the respective counties; that a copy of this resolution be mailed to the honorable county courts of Malheur and Harney counties.

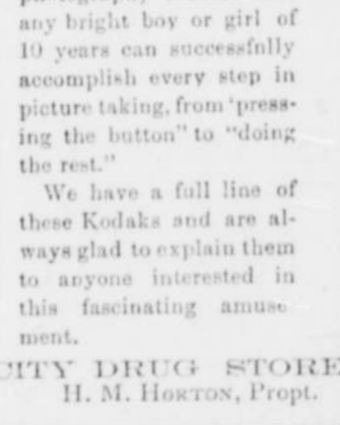
