

STOCKMEN MEET.

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"It might be well for congress to pass a similar law for the remaining grazing lands, and let the homesteader have one year from the date of enactment to choose a homestead, after which time the department of the interior shall permit actual settlers to acquire not to exceed four sections at a value of not less than \$1.25 per acre, on 20 years' time, at 3 per cent interest, no title to vast until principal and interest are paid and the settler has built a home and occupied the land for three years.

The petition of property owners to the City Council asking that an engineer be employed to ascertain the probable cost of a water works system and electric light plant was presented at the meeting Wednesday evening for consideration.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

The following is a synopsis of the president's message or paragraphs of the most important subjects, taken from the Boise Statesman:

Anarchy is a crime against the whole human race; and all mankind should band against the anarchist. His crime should be made an offense against the law of nations, his piracy and that form of manstealing known as the slave trade; for it is of far blacker infamy than either.

When all is said and done, the rule of brotherhood remains as the indispensable prerequisite to success in the kind of national life for which we strive.

I regard it as necessary, with this end in view (the welfare of the wage-worker) to re-enact immediately the law excluding Chinese laborers and to strengthen it wherever necessary in order to make its enforcement effective.

The reclamation of unsettled and arid public lands presents a different problem. Here it is not enough to regulate the flow of streams. The object of the government is to dispose of the land to the settlers who will build homes upon it.

Our people intend to abide by the Monroe doctrine and to insist upon it as the one sure means of securing the peace of the western hemisphere.

Whatever the nation does for the extension of irrigation should harmonize with and tend to improve, the condition of those now living on irrigated land, we are not at the starting point of this development.

Reciprocity must be treated as the handmaiden of protection. Our first duty is to see that the protection granted by the tariff in every case where it is needed is maintained, and that reciprocity be sought for as far as it can safely be done without injury to our home industries.

established to the principal countries with which we have dealings, would be of political as well as commercial benefit.

No single great material work which remains to be undertaken on this continent if of such consequence to the American people as the building of a canal across the isthmus connecting North and South American.

History may safely be challenged to show a single instance in which a masterful race such as ours, having been forced by the exigencies of war to take possession of an alien land, has behaved to its inhabitants with the disinterested zeal for their progress that our people have shown in the Philippines.

I call your attention most earnestly to the crying need of a cable to Hawaii and the Philippines, to be continued from the Philippines to points in Asia. We should not defer a day longer than necessary the construction of such a cable.

The American people must either build and maintain an adequate navy or else make up their minds definitely to accept a secondary position in international affairs, not merely in political, but in commercial matters.

No other citizens deserve so well of the republic as the veterans, the survivors of those who saved the Union. They did the one deed which if left undone would have meant that all else in our history went for nothing.

Our people intend to abide by the Monroe doctrine and to insist upon it as the one sure means of securing the peace of the western hemisphere.

Nothing could be more unwise than to disturb the business interests of the country by any general tariff changes at this time.
