A Terrible Accident.

James, the 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Wiseman, met with a frightful death this morning about 8 o'clock by being thrown from a horse and dragged something over four blocks in Burns. He had ridden the animal down from his home on the hill to water at the well by Miller & Thompson's store. Just as he was leaving the mare got frightened either at some boys skating on a little strip of ice in the street or at the workmen on the cross walks and threw him. His left arm was entangled in the rope and the animal started to run toward home, dragging the helpless boy west to the corner of A. W. Gowan's residence then turned south and ran down toward the Anderson hotel. There she stopped when the boy came against a high crosswalk. Some men near out the rope and picked up the unconscious little fellow and he was later carried to the office of Drs. Marsden and Geary where he died about an hour after the accident. The right side of his skull was literally shattered and the scalp torn away with the brain protruding. The skull was torn off about two inches in width and from his temple back behind his ear. Several men witnessed the accident but were unable to render any assistance.

James A. Wiseman was born in Missouri and was 9 years old the 22 of last April. He came here with his parents two years ago. His shocking death is a severe blow to his parents who have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Presbyterian church. A. J. Irwin will have charge of the service.
