OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

"There is no substitute for thorough-going, ardent, sincere earnestness."

After spending some hours visiting our school the past week, we found ourselves quoting the above. It is very gratifying, to say the least, to know that our children are in the hands of so able a corps of teachers; not only intellectually able, but, more than all, morally strong.

That the moral side of the educational training of our youth is not being sacrificed to the intellectual is evident from room to room in that each instructor takes pains to draw forth the moral phase of each lesson subject and dwells upon the same sufficiently long to fix a deep moral principle within the minds of his pupils.

The most terse lesson of the kind which came to our hearing during our visit was this: In a discussion on the settlement of Pennsylvania by the Quakers, the point of freedom of opinion came up, whereupon the instructor very logically drew out the following: "Think for yourself; yes, think; but BE SURE you think right. Infringe not upon the rights of others by word or act. A terrible calamity has befallen our country by the putting into effect of an erroneous idea."

There is one thing, however, which is allowed to go on that serves to destroy, in a measure, the good work which our instructors are able to accomplish and that is the evil influence which a few persistent truants are steadily and surely casting around their associates.

Parents! You are responsible for this and if you value the future of your boys and girls allow it not to go on. You are paying heavy taxes to defray the expenses of your children's schooling, think you, they are skating themselves into wisdom down on the ice while our instructors are at their posts ready to do their part in training their immortal minds to fit them for a noble future?
