Miss Mint Simmons has been quite sick for the past week but is some better at present.

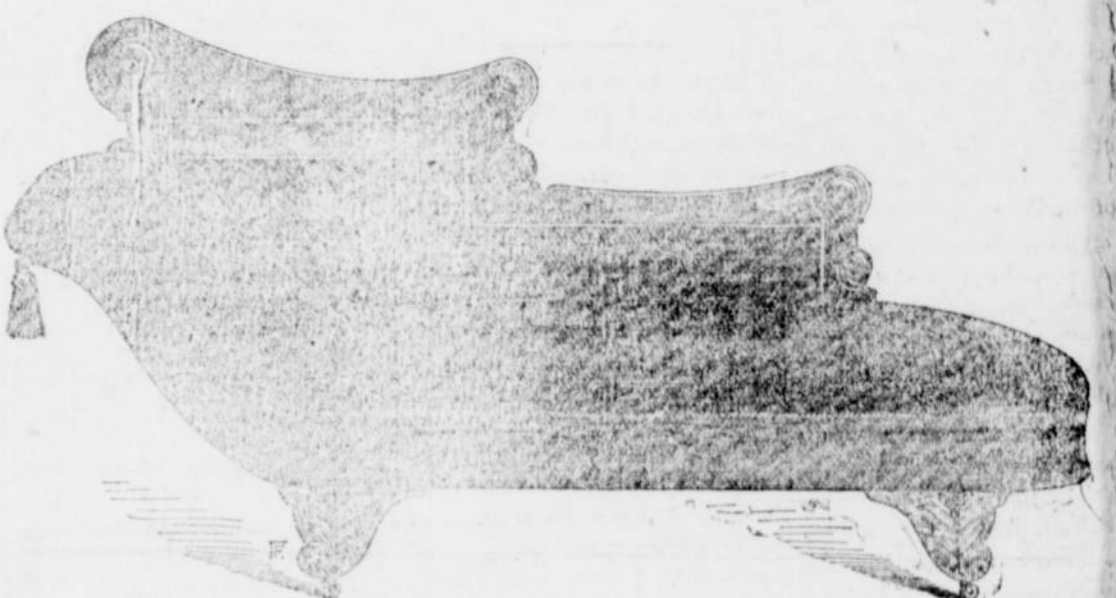
