DEATH OF MRS. EMMA DAVIS.

We are called upon to chronicle the second death in the family of I. M. Davis of Pine Creek. First the youngest son was called away, and now the wife and mother has been called to meet him in the world beyond.

Mrs. Davis was one of those gentle women that to know was but to love. Her home was her sphere. A lover of literature, music and art, one could but think of her only as an example of pure, high standard, noble womanhood. The loss to her home is irreparable, for a happier or more pleasant home than that presided over by this gentle woman in her life time, could not have existed. 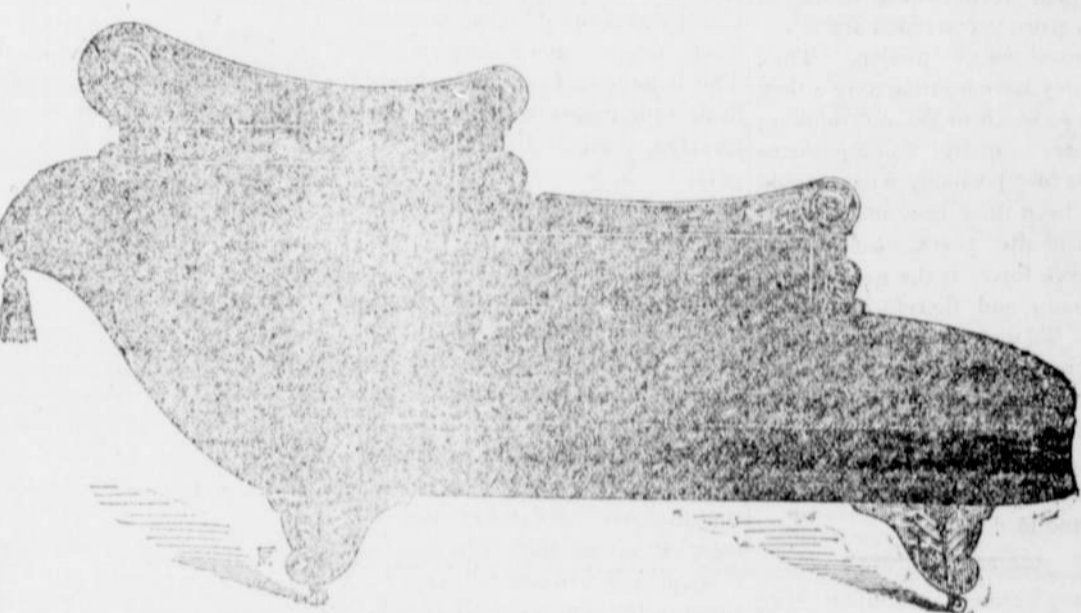
