PHYLIS, THE FARMER'S DAUGHTER.
The Beautiful Operatic Cantata Produced
By Local Talent.

A large and appreciative audience
witnessed the production of the
cantata, "Phyllis, The Farmer's
Daughter" last evening at Floral
hall. The beautiful scenery, paint-
ed especially for the production by
Mr. Phelps was the first pleasant
surprise for the people when the
curtain went up. The wings were
painted to represent trees with a
background of hills and a country
road leading out by a lake. The
effect was indeed fine. The music
was another surprise the local peo-
ple taking part acquitting them-
selves with great credit and plainly
showed careful training and im-
provement under Prof. Phelps.
Mrs. H. C. Levens, as Phyllis never
appeared better and her sweet
voiced solos brought a round of ap-
plause. Mrs. A. C. Finn as Mar-
geret was as much of a success in
her part. She has an excellent
contralto voice and her makeup
and dress were in keeping with the
story and surroundings. Prof.
Phelps, as Douglas, was a success
in every particular. That he is a
thorough musician was plainly
demonstrated in several solos and
also in the quartets and chorus
work. Mr. Holmes, who took the
part of Chapleigh, the duke, was
simply killing in his makeup. His
work in the music line is always
pleasing to his audience. Chas.
Byrd, in the part of Farmer Mead-
ows, rendered two solos with
much credit and his strong deep
voice in the chorus work showed
his wonderful volume.

Between the two acts some beau-
tiful solos were rendered by dif-
ferent ones of the chorus, as well as
after the cantata. Each of the
solos were well received and hearti-

"last, but not least" on the program,
in a character song "Coon." The
little man was in serious trouble on
account of his "baby" having cul-
tivated an aversion for the black
race, and his plaint was "I wish my
color would fade." He was repeat-
edly called back.

Taken as a whole it was the best
production of the kind in Burns
since the cantata "Queen Esther,"
which was staged by E. A. McCoy
and M. N. Fegly here in 1892.
Much credit is due Prof. Phelps for
the manner in which the affair was
conducted.

PHYLIS, THE FARMER'S DAUGHTER.
The Beautiful Operatic Cantata Produced
By Local Talent.

The democratic county con-
vention of Harney county, Oregon, is
hereby called to meet at the circuit
court room in Burns, Oregon, on
Wednesday, the 2nd day of April,
1902, at 9:30 a. m., for the purpose
of nominating candidates for all the
county offices to be filled at the
next general election; to elect three
delegates to the democratic state,
congressional, and district con-
ventions and for the transaction of
such other business as may come
before said convention.

The convention will consist of 65
delegates which have been apportioned
among the several voting
precincts, as follows:
Burns, 11; Harney, 4; Drawsey,
5; Curry, 3; Diamond, 3; Saddle
Butte, 3; Happy, 3; Alvord, 2; Lake
3; Crane, 3; Wild Horse, 3; Poison
Creek, 4; Islrod, 3; Silves, 3; Pine
creek, 4; Catlow, 2; Pueblo, 3;
Warm Springs, 3.

The same being two delegates at
large for each precinct and one for
every 15 votes and a fraction of 8
or over cast in 1900 for Hon. Tho-
mas G. Greene for Supreme Judge.

The central committee recom-
mended that the democrat primar-
ies be held in the several precincts
at the voting place therein on Tues-
day, the 25th day of March, 1902.

Last week while Mr. Geo. T. Parr
was in this county looking after the
interests of the Eastern Oregon
Land Co., he closed a lease with
Messrs. Emory Cole and J. F.
Weaver whereby he leased to those
gentlemen 20,000 acres of grazing
land belonging to his company.

The land leased to Messrs Cole and
Weaver comprises all the odd sec-
tions owned by the company within
their primary limits, beginning at
the J. L. Cole place on Willow
creek, and extending west 11 miles
to the east line of township 15
south, range 40 east, W. M.

Mr. Parr also made a lease of
5000 acres to Mr. J. S. Edwards.
The land leased by Mr. Edwards is
situated in townships 15 and 16 S.,
R. 42 E. W. M., this land being
north and east of Willow creek.

Each of these leases are written
for a term of five years and seven
months, or six grazing seasons.
The lessors are largely interested
in the cattle business, and the
leases are made for the purpose of
keeping sheep off their cattle
range.—Vale Gazette.
