GEO. MCGOWAN GOES TO SCOTLAND.

George McGowan, president of the Ames Mercantile Agency, will start soon on a trip to his old home in Scotland, and, in anticipation of the trip, he has written President Beach, of the Board of Trade, a letter in which he volunteers to do everything possible to disseminate information and distribute available literature among his former countrymen in the land of Bobby Burns.

Mr. McGowan's letter is as follows:

Mr. F. E. Beneh, 133 First street, City—Dear Sir: I am about to undertake a journey to my old home in the heart of agricultural Scotland. Farming conditions are very discouraging there at present, and there is a feeling of unrest and a desire for change. The farmers are very ambitious to reach a country where they can acquire homes of their own—a thing next to impossible in Scotland. If the resources and climate of Oregon could be properly brought to their attention, good results would follow, for there is much to commend our state to Scotchmen. They are a thrifty race, all possessed of more or less means, a substantial gain to any country. Their system of farming would serve as a much-needed object lesson to our own people.

I will do everything possible to disseminate information and will distribute any available literature. It would not be a bad speculation for the body of which you are chairman to furnish a supply of literature bearing on this subject. I will see that the same is circulated where it will tell.

That I may not be confounded with the agents of transportation companies, some credentials as to character and standing would be of value. If you consider the matter of sufficient importance you may submit it to the board or a committee

of the same at your discretion. My intention is to start about the 10th proximo. Very respectfully your obedient servant. GEO. MCGOWAN.

Mr McGowan came to the Pacific Coast thirty-eight years ago. During the civil war he served with distinction in the California volunteers. He began his business career in Oregon in 1870. He established the now flourishing town of Burns, in Harney county. Mr. McGowan will, of course, be furnished with abundant material with which to enlighten his fellow-countrymen of this state's wonderful resources and opportunities.—Portland Telegram.
