The Philippine archipelago and Porto Rico have been finally added to our territory by treaty. That they belong to the United States there can be no question, and now that their annexation has become an accomplished fact, we insist that the constitution of the United States ought to follow the flag and that they should be treated in exactly the same way and manner as inland territory of the United States is treated. There should be absolute freedom of trade between this country and our insular possessions. It is our duty to educate the Filipinos up to our standard of civilization, and in due course of time fit him to participate in his own government and affairs.

"There is no reason why the products of our farm and our factory should not be sent to the Philippines, and in return their hemp, tobacco and sugar be sent to us freed from tariff charges. As long, however, as the tobacco and sugar trusts dictate legislation in the halls of congress, it is more than humanity can hope for to expect the tariff wall to be beaten down between this country and our possessions abroad. "The platform adopted by the convention advocates this policy of treatment toward our insular possessions."—Extract from Geo. E. Chamberlain's speech at Baker City, Friday, April 25.

State Senator William Smith, of Baker City, whom the democrats will re-elect to represent Harney, Malheur and Baker counties in the senate for the next four years, arrived in Burns last Sunday evening in company with Hon. E. H. Test. Senator Smith is recognized as one of the most energetic and careful men ever elected to the upper house of Oregon's legislature. During his four years of service as a member of that body, he has acquired a strength and influence, exercised an industry and watchfulness in the people's interest, and obtained an essential experience in making his excellent legislative record that will be equally as valuable to them in the future sessions as in those already expired. While his party has been in the minority in the legislature, his work has been highly commended by the opposition, who recognized his personal qualities and good judgment. Senator Smith has made many votes by his visit to this county, not only for himself, but for the state ticket. He left Thursday afternoon for Malheur county.

That notorious grafter, John P. Irish, is still serving his masters, having appeared before the House Public Lands Committee last week favoring the leasing of the lands of the public domain for grazing purposes. The fact that Irish favors it is enough to condemn the measure.—Boise Capital News.

The democrats of Harney county can have no objections to their party ticket from top to bottom this year. The selection for each office is good and the taxpayers will register their approval of the convention's choice. Start at governor and place a cross before each democratic nominee down the entire list.

The yawping press begins to follow the Oregonian's lead that George E. Chamberlain is not the proper man for governor, because he has not been a giant in financing. A financier is a man who understands the art of cumulative investments. For instance, a man who can spend \$40,000 to \$50,000 to be elected governor and get his money back.—La Grande Chronicle.

Just before Senator William Smith left our city last Thursday he was informed by one of our citizens (a republican) that the report had been circulated that the Senator was favorable to a lease law. This is not true in any particular as all his intimate friends know. He placed himself on record in the 1900 campaign as bitterly opposed to such a measure. Such a report is absolutely groundless.

News was received this morning from a republican source that the Furnish managers had just completed in Umatilla county a poll of the republican voters of that county, with a view of ascertaining the extent of republican dissatisfaction. The result was not encouraging to the Furnish managers. The straw ballot showed that 700 republican voters would not support Mr. Furnish. As the normal republican majority in Umatilla county is 300, this is virtually a republican admission that Mr. Chamberlain will carry the county by a majority of 400 votes.—Evening Journal.

Hon. E. H. Test, democratic candidate for joint representative of Harney and Malheur counties, was in our city for several days this week, interviewing the voters, and incidentally looking after some business affairs. While Mr. Test is not a stranger in this section, he met many voters here who knew him only by reputation, and we are glad to say he added many new friends to his previous number and gained votes. His pleasing address and well known integrity made a favorable impression, and he will carry Harney county by a handsome majority. Being an energetic and forceful man he is an ideal one for the position of representative. His long residence in Eastern Oregon fits him for the office, as he is thoroughly acquainted with the wishes and needs of his constituents and wide awake to their interests. Mr. Test left Thursday afternoon, accompanied by Senator Smith, for his home in Ontario.

The Portland Journal, (Rep.) says: At this election we are not voting for the retention of the Philippines or for the indorsement of the Roosevelt administration. It is simply changing one set of officials for another set. It concerns Oregon, and no other state. As self comes first, so it is in this case. The morning paper tries its best—or its worst—to draw into this discussion all sorts of issues foreign to the subject. As far as the state is concerned, it would not be a matter of great concern to see it counted in the democratic column. In fact, we could see where it might be of great good.

While we have been prating of our big republican majorities and our loyalty to republican doctrines with their billion-dollar trust appendages, our neighbor on the south—California—and our neighbor on the north—Washington—have been getting about all they have asked for from congress, while we, in Oregon, have been told to go "way back," as we were so solidly in the republican fold that we could not break out if we tried. So we say again that worse could happen than to be called a democratic state. California is not a safe state for the republicans, so it is to be considered. So it is with Washington.

First National Bank of Burns.

The first of the week E. H. Test and John D. Daly looked into the affairs of the Citizens' Bank and a deal was consummated whereby the First National Bank of Burns takes over all the assets of that institution and the old corporation passes out of existence.

The application to the comptroller of currency to establish a national bank in our city has been granted. Mr. Test informs us that the capital stock will be \$25,000. The names of J. D. Daly, Abner Robbins and W. D. Hanley of this county appear in the application. The building, lots, vaults, etc., of the Citizens' Bank go over to the new institution, which will begin business within sixty days. A brick or stone structure will take the place of the present frame. We have not learned what the dimensions of the new building will be.

The advent of so important a business concern indicates strong faith in the permanency and future growth of the town and adjacent country. A financial institution that can furnish the capital will change our business systems and be a factor in doing away with the long credit method that has hampered the merchants and business men of Harney county for many years, on whom has fallen the oppressive burden of carrying men of large stock and property holdings from six to twelve months, until they could realize on their wool and stock.

To Work Oregon Mines.

John X. Williams, Thomas B. Tansy, E. R. Jones, John Hill and H. Snodgrass, all from Bisbee, Arizona, are here and will leave to-morrow for Andrews, Or. They are all experienced miners, who are interested in a gold proposition about fifteen miles from Andrews. A stock company has been formed, in which nearly all those mentioned are interested, and, with Mr. Williams as superintendent, extensive development work will be conducted this summer. The company's claims are situated in Stein mountain, which has been prospected but little. The ledge, Mr. Williams says, is from thirty to sixty feet wide, and is by far the largest he has ever seen in his extensive mining experience. The ore is, of course, low grade, ranging from \$2 to \$12 a ton, but it can be quarried out at but little cost. There is plenty of wood and water near for milling facilities.

The discovery of this big ledge was made five years ago by one of the party, but nothing was done upon it until last year, when Mr. Williams and a party of Bisbeites made an examination and located a number of claims. Now they are going to do enough work on their property to prove its value, and if their expectations are realized they certainly have one of the biggest gold propositions ever discovered.—Winnemucca Silver State April 24.

THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

PORTLAND, April 30, 1902. A crucial point in the present campaign has been Eastern Oregon in its attitude towards the candidates for governor. The democratic state central committee has caused a careful polling of the counties to be made east of the Cascades, with the result that the following official estimate is given out to the public press: Baker county, heretofore democratic by 150, will this year give a majority of 500.

Union county, heretofore 135 democratic, will give a democratic majority this year of 400. Malheur and Harney counties will remain in the democratic list with 300 majority. Umatilla county, nominally republican by 400, will go democratic by 200. Morrow county, which was republican by 150, will probably be about a stand off.

Wallowa county, republican by 50, will be carried for the democratic ticket by at least 100. Grant, Gilliam, Wheeler and Crook counties will vote about evenly.

The democratic ticket will therefore come down to Wasco county with from 1200 to 1500 democratic majority. The situation in Wasco county, according to reliable information, is such as to assure a large democratic gain, with at least some of the candidates carrying a majority vote. The situation is strengthening throughout the district east of the Cascades by a magnificent organization and the utmost vigor on the part of the workers. With a campaign fund only large enough to pay ordinary office expenses at the headquarters, nevertheless, the call for assistance that has gone out has received a generous response.

The above fine showing in Eastern Oregon is highly gratifying, and this, too, with the campaign only beginning. It is peculiarly felicitous to the managers of the campaign that, in spite of the abundance of funds at the command of the opposition, such an encouraging situation is presented at this time.

As to Western and Southern Oregon, the reports coming into headquarters are of like tenor. The organization is especially strong in every county, more so than it has been for years, and the enthusiasm that has been manifest all the time for Mr. Chamberlain is now communicating itself to the entire state ticket.
