### MURDER CASE GONE TO THE JURY.

About Sixty Witnesses Testified and Have Been Excused for the Term.

The work of securing a jury for the trial of George Miller and James Colwell for the killing of Warren Curtis was begun Monday. None of the regular jurors for the term were taken and something over sixty were summoned on a special venire. On Tuesday afternoon the selection of jurors was completed and the examination of witnesses begun. The following were selected as jurymen: R. F. Steward, Drewsey; Thomas Wingfield, Burns; William Altnow Jr., Drewsey; Frank Holladay, Drewsey; R. J. McKinnon, Burns; Ed. Howard, Drewsey; L. N. Stallard, Drewsey; S. W. Hamilton, Drewsey; George McDowell, Drewsey; Link Hutton, Egli; Isaac Foster, Riley; W. M. Stewart, Burns. All these men are stockmen and farmers. At noon yesterday the evidence was all in, about sixty witnesses being examined. At 11 o'clock last night the jury received the instructions of the court, but as yet no verdict has been reached.

The courtroom has been thronged since the opening of the case, and much interest was taken in the matter and speculation indulged in as to the probable verdict. Some think the jury will not agree.

The indictment against Bert Bailey having been dismissed, he took the witness stand in behalf of the state.
