Prairie City was nearly totally destroyed by fire on last Tuesday. It originated in the second story of the Prairie City Hotel from a defective terra cotta flue, about 11:30 a. m. Having no water system the flames soon gained mastery over the inefficient methods of fighting the fire and all efforts were concentrated to saving goods and other portable property in the track of the conflagration. George James, who occupied a room in the hotel, under the influence of liquor, was burned to death, and his charred remains were found in the ruins. The total loss is estimated at \$50,000, of which amount only \$4,500 is covered by insurance.
