The rule is almost universal that when a measure is submitted to the people it must have only a majority of those who vote on the question. But the constitution of Oregon is peculiar and it is quite possible that before any amendment can be adopted a majority of all the voters must vote yes even if not one votes no. Therefore it is important that every friend of the Initiative and Referendum amendment shall vote.

The republicans are trying to bluff it through to the last that Harney county will go down in the republican column this election. Some of their claims are as ridiculous as the Oregonian's figures and fail to have the desired effect. There is nothing modest about them—they claim the whole cheese and hope to put confidence in the weak-kneed Harney county will give Chamberlain the biggest vote ever polled since its creation for any state office and the county ticket will, in most instances, not even be close.

The Portland Journal says: It leaked out that the republican state central committee has made a careful poll of Multnomah county, and has found that the voters stand at this time as follows: Eight thousand voters were seen.

Democrats, 2200. Chamberlain republicans, 3000. Republicans 2800. It is reported from an accurate authority that the poll has caused consternation among the managing committee. And it is therefore known why the committee gave out such padded figures yesterday.

We urgently request the voters to support our nominee for treasurer. Few people have done more for our town and county than Mr. Dalton has. Politics are raging furiously—the most animated contest we have had in years. Many big republican taxpayers are standing for Dr. Daly for county judge, Currier for commissioner and Gus Schroder for sheriff; but it's like horse racing—they will have to come under the wire before we can tell who is elected.

John Hammon, who was pretty well known in your valley in former years, and who lost his wife a few months ago, is about to lease his ranch and take his two children and go to Canada on a visit to relatives. Jack Pantain, of Summer Lake, sold 100 head of two year-old steers for \$25 per head six weeks ago. Three ranches have been taken up on the desert with very flattering prospects. Everything planted on them this season is looking well. There is a fine cattle range close to them. When it is positively known that the Eureka and Weiser railroad is a thing of life thousands of acres will be gobled up by the Arid Land Company, and the man who is entitled to a homestead, under the desert land act, will get left. I am satisfied that artesian water can be found by boring for it.
