Letter From John I. Newman.

Circle City, Alaska, Apr. 16, '02  
The Times-Herald.—To all who these few lines may interest:

I left Dawson on the 2d of Sept. last, on the big Koyukuk stamper that you are reading about on the outside.

I prospected the country and found nothing like hundreds of others. I floated down the Yukon to the mouth of the Chandelar in canoe then poled up the Chandelar 'till we were frozen in by the ice, then mushed into Coldfoot with my sled; was six months on the journey.

Alaska, according to my experience, is a fraud all the way through, there being more men broke than in any country I have been for some time.

There is no business of any kind in here but what is overdone, mining, prospecting, and business of all kinds.

Wages are very low, only five dollars a day and very scarce at that.

I am going to put in the summer here at Circle. Have bought my outfit and leave for the digging, a distance of about sixty-five miles, in the morning.

There are five or six men arriving every day from the Koyukuk, thoroughly disgusted.

Please send me The Times-Herald to Circle City and tell the boys to write to me.

I haven't made a cent since I struck the country—nothing but pay out ever since I arrived.

Dogs sell at from \$5 to \$100 each. We experienced some very cold weather this winter—78 below zero was the coldest. Several were pretty badly frozen and one man died from freezing.

Grub is very high in the Koyukuk, tobacco, \$3.50 per lb; bacon, 65 cents per lb; flour \$30 per hundred and everything in proportion.

A. Spangenberg, road supervisor of district 17, filed his report showing that he had collected \$44.75 and paid out \$45 for work on the road. Report accepted.

F. N. Averill entered into contract to light the court house with electricity for 20 cents per thousand Watts.

J. E. Johnson given contract to raise the grade east of Sweek lane 6 inches for a distance of half a mile for the sum of \$56.

524 scalps counted and destroyed.

Road master filed his official report which was accepted.
