

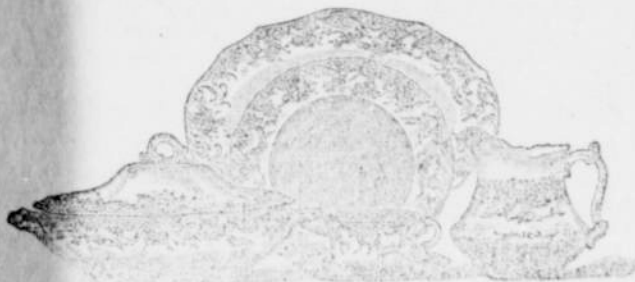

ABNER ROBBINS DEAD.

Abner Robbins, the well known stockraiser who owned large interests in the Drewsey section, died at his home in Union last Saturday, June 14 after an illness of only a few days. Mr. Robbins was 69 years old at the time of his death and was known far and wide on account of his eccentricities. Although one of the wealthiest men in Eastern Oregon and of an age that most men retire from active business life, he spent his entire time--with exception of an occasional visit to his elegant home at Union, where his wife resided--on the range looking after his cattle and sheep interests in this county.

Mr Robbins made his headquarters on one of his ranches near Drewsey among his employees. Preferring this mode of life to idleness and luxury of home and family. He was ever on the go, being still active and energetic at his advanced age, and superintended the work of his various ranches. Deceased located in the Drewsey section in the early 80's where he resided up to the time of his death. Besides the large stock and land interests Mr Robbins was interested in the Mercantile business in Drewsey, the firm being Daly & Robbins. He was also a stockholder in the First National Bank of Burns and Ontario. He leaves a wife at Union and a daughter, Mrs James Lucky who resides in Portland. Many a young man in eastern Oregon owes his start and success to the generosity of Abner Robbins and he will ever be remembered by the people of this section.
