ENCOURAGE IMMIGRATION.

Our attention has been called to the number of letters that are received here asking for general information concerning the country: its resources, possibilities, its adaptation to diversified farming, stockraising, mineral prospects, the amount of vacant land, its nature, timber, irrigation, etc. We learn that the local land office receives numerous communications of this nature, the county clerk's office is also flooded, the post master and many individuals. People have not only the time nor the information at hand to give these prospective homeseekers a general letter on these lines.

It has been suggested by a number of our prominent business men that a mass meeting be called for the purpose of getting up a pamphlet giving in detail the advantages and opportunities of this section to homeseekers; also to raise funds to have 5000 or 10,000 printed.

We consider this an important matter and hope it will be carried out without any unnecessary delay. The railroad companies of the west are working with the people on this same line to help advertise the various sections contiguous to their roads, and it is proving quite successful.

This is not a matter to sit and ponder over. It does not require a second thought to see its advantages. It should be acted upon at once. We should encourage immigration in every possible manner. The plan suggested is a very economical and practical way of reaching these people. The business men of Burns should take hold of this proposition and push it. We are reliably informed that the Harney Valley Improvement Co. will assist very materially in the work.

If business men would lose sight of self interests in all public matters that tend to upbuild and benefit a whole community or county, much more could be accomplished. Why not enter into such work with the same energy and zeal as a private enterprise when it will develop and increase the business of the whole section?

The county court of Grant has passed strong resolutions against the forest reserve recently created in the Strawberry mountains. The Blue Mountain Eagle has also sent out copies of a protest in the form of petitions to the various precincts of that county to obtain signatures which will be forwarded to Washington.

Helen Stone, the kidnapped missionary, says the prayers did more for her release than all the cash contributed. Helen should have spoken sooner. The people could have prayed and kept their cash, and possibly Helen would still be with brigands, suggests irreverent exchange.

Not one newspaper, printed within the lines of the so-called forest reserve, or within the county of which the reserve takes a part, has said one word in advocacy of the outrageous proposition. They but reflect the sentiment of the people affected, who are unanimously opposed to the measure.—Blue Mountain Eagle.

many sales of state land at prices which have been satisfactory, and if any member of the board has fault to find, he has not made it public. It is because the duties of the office have become entirely different that the suggestion of a change has been made regarding the manner of appointment.

There has been some talk of depriving the governor of the power of appointing a superintendent of the penitentiary, and it was plainly hinted that this would be done in order to keep the democrats from getting state positions. Such a move would, of course, be opposed upon political grounds. The proposed change in the management of state land affairs is not placed upon partisan grounds, but upon the general rule that a subordinate official should receive his appointment from the body he represents and under whose directions he must work.

The office of State Land Agent pays a salary of \$1800 a year, and a stenographer is allowed \$600. If the appointing power should be vested in the State Land Board, the State Land Agent and stenographer would probably become attaches of the State Land Department. This would often be found a convenience, as then the two office forces could assist each other when work is pressing.—Oregonian

A Former Resident Honored

J. C. Garrett, the old-time democratic war horse, who for years was a prominent figure in politics in this county, has been honored by his party at his new home, Okanogan county, Washington, with the nomination of representative to the legislature. J. C. has many friends in this county who will be pained to know that his good qualities have so soon been found out by his neighbors. It is to be hoped the voters of Okanogan county will elect such men as J. C. Garrett all along the line, as they would then be assured of a good, clean and conscientious administration of public affairs. If J. C. is elected the interests of his constituents will be zealously guarded.

The democratic party of Harney county repeatedly tendered Mr. Garrett a place on the legislative ticket, but he always refused to accept.

ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT CHANGED HANDS

A local company now has control of the electric light and power plant, having purchased the business from F. N. Averill. The transfer was made the first of the week to The Electric Light & Power Co., incorporated for \$70,000 paid up capital. The officers of the new company are, H. M. Horton, president; C. Cummins, vice president; N. U. Carpenter, treasurer; E. O. Jackson, secretary.

A new dynamo is ordered and a 60-horse power engine and boiler will also be added to the plant at once. The company has arranged a new residence scheduled at \$1.25 for the first light and 50 cents for each additional light of 16 candle power. Wiring rates have also been reduced.

Third Day—Three-fourth mile trot or pace, best two in three, for horses bred in Harney county, \$75.
