DELEGATES TO IRRIGATION MEETING.

Harney County Will be Well Represented By Able Men.

Hon. I. S. Geer, Dalton Biggs, N. U. Carpenter and M. Fitzgerald took their departure this morning for Portland, as delegates to the irrigation convention which meets in that city next Tuesday. Judge Levens, who had been appointed a delegate by Gov. Geer, made preparations to go but was detained at the last moment by sickness. We understand the delegation will be joined in Portland by W. D. Hanley and Judge L. R. Webster of the Harney Valley Improvement Co. With such men to look after interests Harney county will be well represented as they are all able men, well acquainted with her opportunities and adaptability to irrigation.

This section offers the best opportunity of any in the state for a big irrigation project. More vacant arid land can be reclaimed in proportion to expenditure than any other section.
