County Court Doings.

Report of J. F. Mahon as road supervisor of district No 14 accepted and account fully settled.

Official bond of J. E. Loggan as assessor with T. G. Houser, Chas. Roper, L. B. Hayes and Wm. Russell as sureties, accepted.

Elmer Parker accepted as county charge from Dec. 31, 1902.

P. C. Peterman of Pueblo precinct granted a liquor license for six months from January 7 to July 7.

The semi-annual statement with the sheriff showed all accounts correct.

In the semi-annual settlement with the county clerk his accounts were found to be correct.

The 1902 tax levy was made as follows, county, 13 mills, school, 5 mills; road, 7 mills; state 7 1/2 mills; building 1 mill.

Report of W. R. Gray, road supervisor of district No. 9, accepted and his account fully settled.

The court is making up the jury list for the ensuing term.

A person holding an unrecorded deed giving absolute title cannot have his deed defeated by the conveyance of the property at a subsequent time by the grantor named in the original instrument in the substance of a decision rendered by Circuit Judge Boise. The case passed upon was that of Mrs Bessie Randall vs. C. G. Lingwall, being a suit to quiet title to a residence and eight lots in University Addition to Salem. In 1888, just before O. P. Randall married the plaintiff, he transferred the property in dispute to his brother, Thos J. Randall. Three years later the brother reconveyed the property to O. P. Randall, who with his family subsequently removed to Southern Oregon. The latter failed to have the deed recorded, and in the spring of 1893 he was drowned in Rogue river. In the following spring Thos J. Randall transferred the property by warranty deed to Lingwall, for a consideration of \$1050. The deed of reconveyance from Thosmas J. to O. P. Randall, executed in 1891, was afterwards discovered by the widow among her husband's effects, and a suit was brought to get possession of the property. In deciding the case Judge Boise holds that Lingwall purchased and took possession of the property with the knowledge that it belonged to another party. Thos Randall is also declared to have wrongfully and fraudulently conveyed the property to Lingwall. The decree of the court orders the deed from Randall to Lingwall be set aside and canceled.—Ex.

M. Brown, who spent several months in this section and who recently left here and located at Weiser, Idaho, in a recent letter to the Lakewiew Herald states that among the good things in prospect was the immediate prospects of a railroad from the Weiser valley to Lakeview, Klamath Falls and on to the heavy timber belt of the Cascade range and make connection with the Southern Pacific. A large crew of railroad surveyors are now in the field surveying a line from this valley toward Burns.

Volp Has More Trouble.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 7.—Dr. Henrich Volp, of Portland, Ore., was expelled from the examination rooms of the State Medical Board yesterday on the charge of attempting to secure a license to practice medicine by unfair means. The board made a statement of the matter today, attempting, however, to withhold the name of the man expelled. It appears that Volp was caught during the examination referring to a small compendium to find answers to questions put by the examiners.
