#### IRRIGATION COPY SENT DIRECT.

Dear Sir:—We, the undersigned members of the Oregon Irrigation association, desire to know why our irrigation project of Harney county has been held up. It was the order of the Association that these propositions be sent to Washington with the approval of the Association January 20th, 1903, and it was generally considered that Harney county had the best project in the state, by nearly every county in the state.

You have no authority to hold up these maps etc. after that date, and we insist that you send our Harney county project direct, with the endorsement of the Association as ordered.
