An agent of the Swift & Co. packing people is again in Portland looking for a location for a branch packing house.

The city council will take up the matter of public nuisances at its next meeting and will order all rubbish removed from the premises and alleys, water closets will have to be removed from positions adjacent to the street, barn yards cleaned, etc.

Considerable talk has been done in regard to quarantining against Prineville and that section where smallpox is raging. County Physician Marsden phoned the State Board Thursday, and received a reply from the secretary to the effect that it would be unnecessary, as all cases had been quarantined and those who had been exposed were under observation, and the health board was satisfied there would be no more spread of the disease.

The new health law, which has been in force since Feb. 17, requires every physician, midwife or head of the family to give notice by the end of the month to the county health officer of any birth that occurs under his or her charge. Every physician, midwife or head of a family must give notice to such health officer within 48 hours of every death. No burial can take place until a proper burial certificate has been made out, and transmitted to the county health officer.

If our people would take into consideration a few things the outside firms that invade Harney county every season and take orders for goods would not be able to come again. Your home merchant is reliable and you know that he will do as he agrees. He helps you; spends his money with you; trusts you when you need it and in many instances carries you on his books for an indefinite period. He buys your butter, eggs, grain, etc. He helps to build up and develop the country; he gives freely to all charitable institutions; he helps to educate your children.

It is right that he should make a profit on his goods, as it costs money to run his establishment. He has to live, pay his taxes and generally waits longer for his money than he agrees to. He has to pay his bill at the wholesale houses promptly whether it is convenient or not.

Patronize home and keep the money within your own county. Let the home merchant figure on your cash orders, and we will bet our old hat you will find it to your advantage in the end. If you have any old scrap iron, second hand machinery, broken legged horses, worthless "pups" or any old thing we know where you can get a bargain any day. The manager of this great religious weekly is an easy mark. All one has to do is to tell him its a good thing and he'll bite—even if he has to borrow the money. The blasted old engine which we have harped about for the past six or eight months, and which was bought for the purpose of driving our big press and type setting machine, is one of his best

and brightest purchases. It is found that it leaks around the piston to such an extent that it hasn't force enough to run itself, without being hitched on to the machinery.

While it is very discouraging and he admits being a "sucker," the great religious will continue to dispense the local news regularly each week just the same, at least as long as our creditors are as lenient as in the past, and some time in the remote future we will start the machinery even if the manager has to borrow more money and buy an engine. In the meantime if two or three hundred delinquent subscribers would call and pay up we would pay our debts and could devote more time to gathering news.

GRAND JURY REPORT.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Harney County. To the Hon. Morton D. Clifford, Circuit Judge.

We the grand jury for the regular April, 1903, term of the above-entitled court beg leave to submit this our final report. We have been in session for five days, during which time we have examined into all matters brought to our attention, and have returned into court three true bills of indictment only; a sufficient testimonial of the county's moral improvement and for which we congratulate the taxpayers of the county. We have examined into the condition of the county poor, of whom there are but two, and whose condition is being made as comfortable as possible and satisfactory to all concerned; no complaints coming from the inmates.

We have examined into the affairs of the several offices and find by comparison the balances in the Treasurer's books and moneys on hand to be correct. The Sheriff's books show that the amount charged to the sheriff on the tax roll for 1902 as \$70,717.20, of which amount there has been collected in cash \$62,211.85 and in county warrants \$1353.66, rebates \$1826.58, leaving a balance outstanding and uncollected of \$5325.11, and which we consider a remarkable as well as healthy financial showing. We find the county clerk's office as usual in the very best of order and very attractive. We find the assessor's office fully equipped with necessary maps, plats and data for a correct assessment of the realty of the county, and the assessor attentive to his duties. We have heard no complaint relative to the county roads and bridges and from our individual observation and experience we are pleased to report the roads and bridges of Harney County equal if not superior to any county in the state. The court house and grounds are kept in excellent condition under the efficient supervision of the chief officers and Superintendent Thomas Howard; and we wish we could say as much for that necessary appendage—the water closet. This building should be removed from its present site to one not so public and conspicuous, and should be so arranged as to be less offensive both as to sanitation and comfort. The county through its county court should set an example in sanitation, by removal or otherwise of all offensive matter thereabout. We would recommend that the county court have the jail floor repaired, and suitable bedding furnished the sheriff for use in the jail. There is a subject we desire to mention in our report at this time which may be deemed an innovation—and that is the live stock interests of our county. During this term of your court, as usual, we have met and conversed with citizens from all parts of the county and upon comparing notes, as it were, we find the stock growers throughout the county making better provision for the preservation

tion and comfort of their dumb brutes, and, although we have just passed through a long and somewhat severe winter, the loss of live stock has not exceeded what is natural; less than one per cent. Hence we congratulate the county, both from a humane as well as a financial standpoint.

We would further recommend to the Honorable county court to assist where it can in furthering the efforts now being made in behalf of government aid for the storage of water for irrigation of this vast inland empire.

And now having completed our duties, we thank your Honor and all the officers for courtesies received during the session, and most respectfully ask to be discharged.

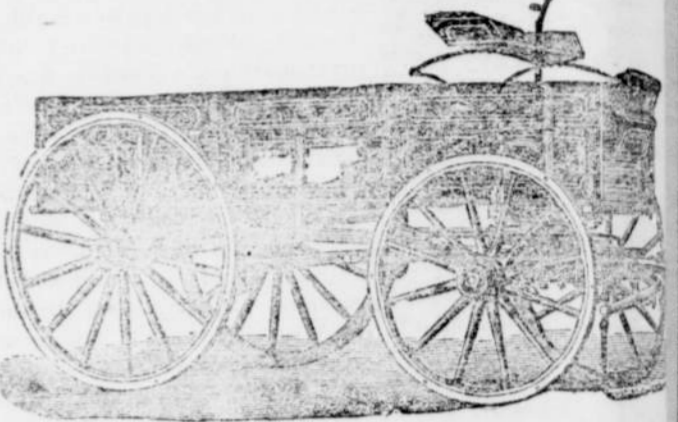
