A very sad and fatal accident occurred at the White Horse ranch last Monday by which Len H. Rager lost his life. Deceased and another teamster were coupling a trail wagon, the other driving while Mr. Rager was steering the short tongue on to the "horn." He missed his aim and the two wagons came together, catching his head and neck between them crushing his skull from which he died instantly.

The body was brought to Burns, a distance of 150 miles and the remains were interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery Thursday, Harney Lodge No 77 having charge of the funeral.

Mr. Rager was about 30 years old and had been in the employ of the P. L. S. Co for about two years. He was a member of Monroe Lodge No 289, I. O. O. F., of Willows California. He was unmarried and leaves an aged mother in Missouri and one brother in Oklahoma.

Deceased was held in high esteem by all his acquaintances being an exemplary young man of temperate habits and genial nature.
