TO MEET THE RAILROAD PROMOTER

Delegation From Board of Trade Will Confer With Major Bonta.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade this afternoon the committee on constitution and by-laws reported and same was adopted. It was granted to the delegation to Prairie City to confer with Major Bonta in regard to the extension of his electric railway to Burns.

During his recent visit to outside points G. W. Oberinger met the railroad promoter and together with the latter's attorneys and chief engineer, talked the proposed railway extension over. Mr. Oberinger found the railroad people very anxious to discuss the proposed extension and they desire information about this section.

From his conversation it was learned Major Bonta does not expect a bonus, nor does he expect or demand any unreasonable support in a financial way. He desires, particularly, the good will and influence of the people of this section in the promotion of the enterprise, and such data as would be required by his eastern backers in regard to the field he proposes to tap.

The following gentlemen will visit Major Bonta as representatives of the Board of Trade: Hon. I. S. Geer, N. U. Carpenter, Dr. W. L. Marshall, C. E. Keaton, F. S. Bieder, Tom Allen and R. A. Miller. These gentlemen are all representative citizens, and will be able to furnish such information as shall be required. As Major Bonta has expressed a desire to visit this section in person, the delegation will extend him an invitation to return with them to look over the situation. No doubt this will be accepted.

It is the intention to have the line completed to Prairie City by January 1st next. The prospects are good for its completion to Burns next year.
