A press dispatch of recent date to the Oregonian from Washington, states that the regulations in the reservation of the Blue Mountain forest reserve are being better understood protests have died away.

"A Blue Mountain forest reserve is deemed important, not only for the preservation of the timber, but more particularly for the protection of the water supply. With irrigation enterprises springing up in all parts of the state east of the Cascades, the water becomes of more and more value, and it is recognized to be far more essential today that the streams should be perpetuated than it was when irrigation was not thought of.

GOVERNMENT ENGINEERS IN SILVIE;

Making Preliminary Survey of Proposed Irrigation Works.

M. D. Williams, assistant engineer of the Hydrographic Department of the Government, arrived here Thursday from Ontario with a full corps of men to make a detailed topographic survey of the Silvie valley reservoir site.

The party left for that section yesterday to take up the work. Mr Williams informed The Times-Herald that this work would take considerable time—a month at least. This will in all probability include surveys in this valley for canals and ditches.

Not having seen the site Mr. Williams could give no opinion as to its feasibility. However, the fact that the Government has made such recognition of it as to send a corps of engineers to make thorough investigations, is of sufficient significance to warrant encouragement and hopes.

Our local irrigation association has left no stone unturned to bring this matter before the Government and now that work has actually begun the same vigilance will not lax, but everything possible will be done to further the cause.

With the present prospects for government irrigation works and a railroad, Harney county has a bright future. In this matter it is much satisfaction to know that we are under obligations to no one. It has been brought about by our own wide awake people, which speaks well for the class of men in our midst.

To Arrange for Celebration.

A meeting was held at the law office of Parrish & Rembold last Wednesday evening to consider the proposition of celebrating the Fourth of July. The meeting was not largely attended, but those present were in favor of doing something toward celebrating. Rev. Father Doyle was made chairman and C. N. Cochrane secretary. A general committee was appointed consisting of Father Doyle, Ike Schwartz, James Donegan, H. E. Thompson, J. M. Dalton, H. M. Horton and C. N. Cochrane to see what could be accomplished. This committee has the power to appoint sub-committees to look after the various features, such as sports, races, decoration, finance, entertainment, illuminations, etc. As yet the finance committee has not reported and the program cannot be announced, as that will depend largely on the amount subscribed.

It is the intention to have some saddle horse races, baseball, basketball, etc., and possibly an athletic tournament including all kind of field sports. It is not known at this time positively, whether Can-

yon City ball teams will be our guests on that occasion or not. All plans will be definitely arranged and announced next week.

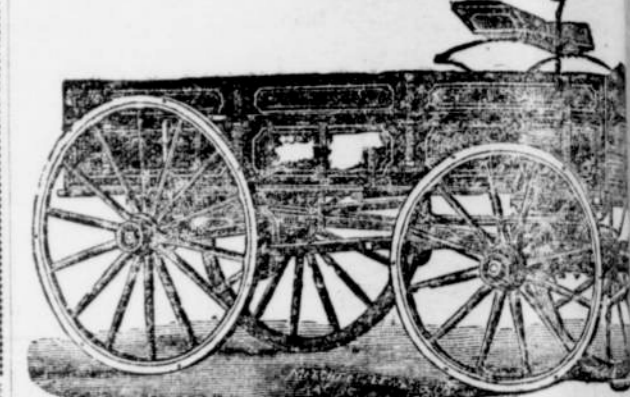
