Binger Hermann was elected to congress last Monday from the first district to fill the vacancy caused by the death of T. H. Tongue. His plurality over A. E. Reams the democratic nominee, was 1800. At the last election Mr. Young's majority was over 7000. The democrats having cut down this by a large slice, are very well satisfied with the result.

Had not the President visited Oregon just at the time he did, even republicans say, the democratic nominee would have been elected. President Roosevelt's recognition of the ex-commissioner gained him more than 1800 votes. Mr. Hermann may be a rascal, but he accomplished more for Oregon during the time he represented this state in congress than any other man, with the possible exception of Senator Mitchell. Mr. Hermann's long experience will enable him to secure important committee places and while the democrats would have been pleased to elect Mr. Reams, from a party view, they realize Hermann's superior knowledge and wide acquaintance will be more beneficial to the state.

The Democrat says the Sumpter railroad will be extended into the John Day valley at once. It is asserted that the road will be pushed right along and extend into Central Oregon, cross cutting the territory to be tapped by the Columbia Southern.
