Interesting Fossils.

Hon. C. W. Parrish returned Wednesday from a visit to the North Fork of the Malheur, where he found a large fossil bed and procured some very interesting specimens for the Native Sons cabinet.

Among the collection is a fossil fish—probably a salmon—presented by Elias Thompson of Agency Valley. The fish is nearly two and one-half feet in length. The rib bones show plainly, also the medial line on the back and where the dorsal fin has been. The cavity in the fish is of chalcodony. It is a very valuable specimen.

He also found fossilized leaves in layers of successive sedimentary deposits of a chalky substance, somewhat in the nature of Kavlun.

Among this collection are some of the most perfect leaves possible to obtain. Some of them appearing to have retained the autumn color. This collection was secured right from the surface and Mr. Parrish thinks he will be able to add some better, or a greater variety rather, on a future visit.


