## SCOTT ELECTED PRESIDENT

### THE OREGONIAN EDITOR HEADS THE LEWIS AND CLARK FAIR.

#### President Will Have General Charge of the Exposition and Director-General Business Management.

The directors of the Lewis and Clark Fair have elected H. W. Scott president and H. W. Goode director-general. A resolution adopted by the board authorizes the new director-general to visit San Francisco, Nashville, Atlanta and New Orleans, where exhibitions of practically the same size as that planned for Portland have been held, and consult with the officers who made these fairs a success.

Under the resolutions adopted by the board the director-general will have charge of the business management of the exposition. He will give practically all of his time to the work and will be entirely responsible for the administration of affairs at the exposition grounds. The president's duties have been lightened considerably. It was declared that the president would be compelled to "sit on the safety valve" and to consult with committees, heads of department, officers of the association and in a general way keep in touch with Exposition affairs.

Other officers elected were: I. N. Fleischer, first vice-president; W. D. Wheelwright, second vice-president; Samuel Connell, third vice-president; Henry Reed, secretary; First National Bank, treasurer.

Adolphe Wolfe has filled the position of second vice-president and auditor of the Lewis and Clark Exposition. Had he been willing to accept the responsibilities of the position, the directors were inclined to elect him first vice-president and ask him again to take up the duties of auditor. Mr. Wolfe, however, was compelled to decline both offices.

The board of directors did not elect an auditor. The question has been considered several times and there seems to be a strong sentiment in favor of selecting someone who will accept the position of auditor and devote his entire attention to the accounts of the Exposition Company. It was decided to leave the question with the finance committee, which will consult with the president and secretary, reporting at the regular meeting of the board on August 14.

No successor was elected to W. W. Cotton, who resigned as director of the Exposition Company. Mr. Cotton's plans for the coming year will take him out of the city most of the time, and he could not devote the attention to the work that he believes necessary. A special committee a new member of a member of the board.

A special committee of five had been designated at a previous meeting to take up the question of the organization of the board, and its report upon the best plan of organization was adopted. The committee recommended the election of Mr. Scott as president, and defined his duties as those prescribed in the by-laws of the company. It was explained that the president would not be expected to give his attention to the detail management of the Exposition affairs; that this could be better done by a director-general. A business man selected from the business men of Portland, one thoroughly in touch with local affairs and able to give his attention to the business management of the Exposition, was urged. A salary of \$500 per month and expenses was suggested. The committee recommended H. W. Goode as director-general, and the recommendations were approved. Mr. Goode will assume the duties of his office on September 1, but in the meantime he is authorized to visit those cities which have held similar exhibitions and study the plan of operation they followed.—Oregonian.
