FARMERS SHOULD TAKE INTEREST.

Make a Good Showing at The Harney County Fair This Year.

Editor Times-Herald:—The Harney County Fair will soon be here, and in view of the necessity of a creditable exhibit of farm and garden produce at the fair this fall, I think the people should be urged to make the best possible exhibit along these lines. I emphasize the necessity this year for several reasons. The most important, however, being the fact that the eyes of the Government experts and outside world are upon us.

The Government agents are making surveys, gathering data and information regarding our valley. They are making special investigations about the possibilities of future productions in the valley. They want to know about the fruit, vegetables, grains, grasses and other products that "are now, and can hereafter be raised. And undoubtedly the exhibits at the coming Fair will be taken as an indication of what we can raise. We should tell them in no uncertain language.

While this has been an unfavorable year, in some respects, yet if everyone would take an interest in showing the products of their gardens, orchards and fields, the exhibit would be a credit to any country. We are interested in the proposed Government Reservoir, and the reclamation of our Arid lands, and it is safe to say that if we show that we can raise little that is of value it will certainly influence the action of the Government officials, against us. The Fair committee here advertised premiums for a great many farm, garden and dairy products. We have our chance to make a display of them, and a meager or discreditable display will be a great injury to Harney County's interests. Already, in other parts of the state, while admitting, practically, our natural advantages for the proposed Government Irrigation works the howlers are crying us down because we can raise little or nothing here.

Shall we admit the correctness of their claims by making a display that does no credit to us or our productions? I hope not, and I believe not if the importance of this matter is brought to the attention of the people. And why should we not have a creditable display? The Fair committee here offered more liberal premiums this year than ever before. The people here have plenty to exhibit—the expense of exhibiting is almost nothing; the only cost is a little time and attention. Perhaps some consider the premiums as small. I can't believe that this is an excuse. Harney county people are not so sordid as that. We certainly cannot expect to make money out of a fair. It is not a money making institution and was never intended to be. Although the premiums this year are more liberal than ever and intended with the limited means at the committee's command to compensate for the little expense of making the exhibit. Some of the most creditable displays last year, were made with out regard to whether a premium was offered for the products displayed, but solely to show what could be done with a little care and attention.

This is the proper spirit. The only excuse that can be offered is a lack of interest, and this is no excuse. Let us take an interest. Look to the future interests of your county. Take a pride in our home products, and in displaying them. And for our own interest and our county's interest, don't let us stand back and wait until others make their exhibits and then say "I could have done better than that." That puts us in the class of "knockers," who have no rightful place and serve no useful purpose in Harney county at present. Let us make one long pull, one strong pull and pull together and show what we can do if we try. I hope, Mr. Editor, that you will urge this matter on the attention of the public.

FAIR WEEK SPORT PROGRAM.

First day—Maiden race for Harney county saddle horses that never run for public money, purse \$75.

One-quarter mile dash, free for all, \$100.

Second Day—One-quarter mile dash for Harney county saddle horses that never run for public money, \$50.

Three-eighth mile dash, free for all, \$125.

Three-fourth mile heats, 2 in 3, trot or pace, for 2-year-olds, free for all, \$75.

Third Day—One-half mile dash, free for all, \$150.

Three-fourth mile heat, trot or pace, for horses bred in Harney county, \$75.

Robin contest.

Fourth Day—Base ball, Canyon City vs. Burns, for cup, Basket ball, Canyon City vs. Burns. Purse \$25. Gun club shoot \$50.

Fifth Day—One-half mile heats, 2 in 3, free for all, \$125.

Three-fourth mile heats, trot or pace, free for all, \$125.

Sixth Day—Three-fourth mile dash free for all \$150.

Relay race \$100.

Seventh Day—consolation purses. Conditions—All the above events are free for all unless otherwise stated. In all races, five to enter and three to start, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than five to fill, by reducing the purse in proportion to the horses entered. All entries to close at 8 o'clock sharp the evening before the race. California Jockey Club rules to govern all races, except weights. All aged horses to carry not less than 125 pounds. Trotting or pacing races will be governed according to National Trotting Association rules. The relay race is five times around the track; five horses; change horses each time around; rider to change own rig; saddle and blanket separate; saddle cinched with latigo; choice of bits. Entrance fee ten per cent of purse. Money in races to be divided as follows: First money 70 per cent, second money 30 per cent. The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races in the event of their not filling, also to postpone any and all of the program on account of inclement weather.

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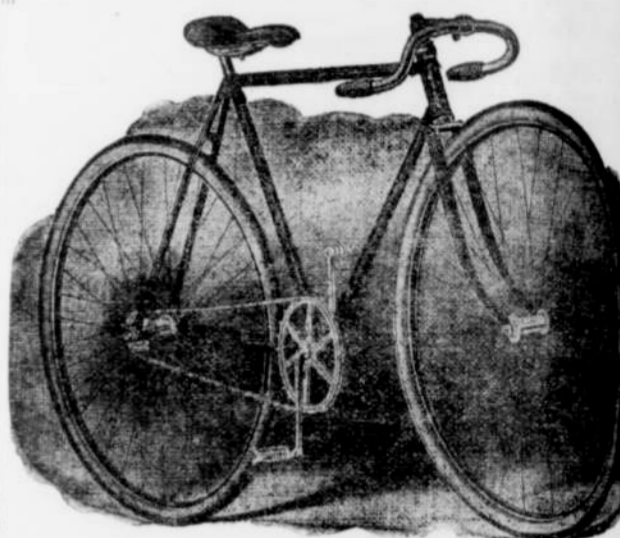
