TOWN CLOCK OR LIBRARY?

THE Times-Herald suggested the playing of a benefit by the Georgia Harper Co. for the purpose of buying a town clock. It was at once accepted by that excellent dramatic company, and they will produce "Married for Money," a side-splitting comedy on Wednesday, Sept. 9, the entire receipts to go toward the benefit. The Times-Herald has secured the hall free of charge and there will be no expense whatever.

THE Times-Herald has also interviewed Judge Levens and Commissioner Williams in regard to erecting a tower and placing the clock on the court house. Both officers have given their word that the county would go to that expense when the clock was received. The Electric Light and Power Co. will place a large electric light inside without charging—except for the wiring.

SOME of our citizens prefer that the funds go toward a circulating library, and in order to determine the voice of the people of our city The Times-Herald will give them an opportunity to vote. The Georgia Harper Co. has no preference in the matter and it is left to the property owners and people interested to decide what the fund shall be used for—a clock or a library.

FORT BIDWELL INDIAN SCHOOL.

Charles D. Rakestraw, Supt. of the Government Indian Industrial School at Fort Bidwell, California, has been in the city the past few days. He is accompanied by Tommy Evans an interpreter and old Chief Otocho. The latter is a noted Indian character of the west and successor of Winnemucca as chief of the Putes.

Supt. Rakestraw is here in the interest of the school and has succeeded in getting several Pute children to enter the school. Efforts have been made several times to get the Indian children from this section to enter the school but without avail. The people of Burns realize the benefit of such an institution and seeing the conditions under which the young Reds are being brought up in idleness, filth and ignorance, the gladly lend their influence to better their condition.

The school is maintained by the Government and the Indian children are clothed, fed, taught the English language and industrial pursuits. Quite a contrast to the mode of living and surroundings here.

Supt. Rakestraw informed The Times-Herald reporter that he would make another visit to our section or send a representative during Fair week to get any other children that might be found at that time. He will also send an exhibit for the fair, showing pictures of the buildings, the students, and also specimens of the work of the Indian children, etc. Hon. C. W. Parrish will look after the exhibit which will be an attraction to the visitors as well as the means of getting Indian children interested in the school.

Chief Otocho is about 90 years old as near as Mr. Rakestraw can learn and a very interesting Indian. Although he has been blind for 25 years he is of cheerful disposition and has a wonderful memory. Chief Otocho had not visited this section for over 30 years but was familiar with every land mark and old trail and gave his companions while en route a description of the country through which they passed with astonishing accuracy, in fact would describe things that had not been noticed by his companions who could see.

FAIR WEEK SPORT PROGRAM.

First day—Maiden race for Harney county saddle horses that never run for public money, purse \$75. One-quarter mile dash, free for all, \$100.

Second Day—One-quarter mile dash for Harney county saddle horses that never run for public money, \$50.

Three-eighth mile dash, free for all, \$125. Three-fourth mile heats, 2 in 3, trot or pace, for 2-year-olds, free for all, \$75.

Third Day—One-half mile dash, free for all, \$150.

Three-fourths mile heat, trot or pace, for horses bred in Harney county, \$75.

Roping contest. Fourth Day—Base ball, Canyon City vs. Burns, for cup. Basket ball, Canyon City vs. Burns. Purse \$25. Gun club shoot \$50.

Fifth Day—One-half mile heats, 2 in 3, free for all, \$125. Three-fourths mile heats, trot or pace, free for all, \$125.

Sixth Day—Three-fourths mile dash free for all \$150. Relay race \$100.

Seventh Day—consolation purses. Conditions—All the above events are free for all unless otherwise stated. In all races, five to enter and three to start, but the Association reserves the right to hold a less number than five to fill by reducing the purse in proportion to the horses entered. All entries to close at 8 o'clock sharp the evening before the race. California Jockey Club rules to govern all races, except weights. All aged horses to carry not less than 125 pounds. Trotting or pacing races will be governed according to National Trotting Association rules. The relay race is five times around the track; five horses; change horses each time around; rider to change own rig; saddle and blanket separate; saddle cinched with lariat; choice of bits. Entrance fee, ten per cent of purse. Money in races to be divided as follows: First money 70 per cent, second money 30 per cent. The Association reserves the right to change any of the above races in the event of their not filling, also to postpone any and all of the program on account of inclement weather.

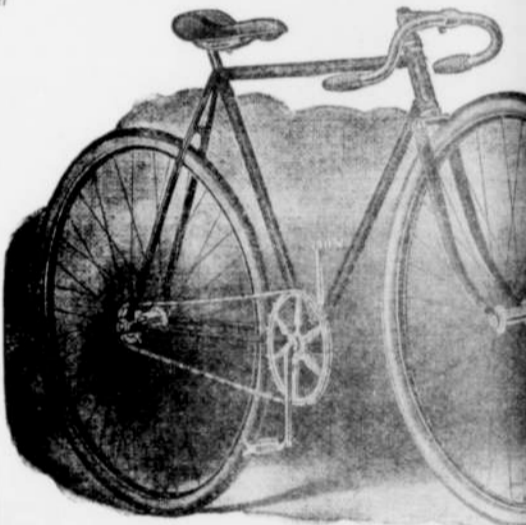
